BIG REAL ESTATE DEAL

51 P N NORTH TORONTO

Yonge Street Property Sold at High Figure—County and Suburban Happenings.

NORTH TORONTO, March 22.—(Special.)—Never in the history of the Town of North Toronto has there been such a big, substantial demand for real estate as have values approached anything like the high prices being paid today. If the winter months were in a measure unmarked by any striking transfers of property, the coming summer bids fair to make amends.

Within the last two or three days a number of important property deals have gone thru, and the figures given will show all the real estate activity is not centred around the corner of Yonge and Carlton.

A big block of land on Briar Hill and Hawthorne-avenue, about 1000 feet frontage altogether, which was bought last week for \$200,000, has now been sold for \$300,000. The property is vacant, and across the westerly side there runs a small ravine. It is the intention of the buyers to subdivide the property and place it on the market.

Another big real estate deal just closed is that of the northeast corner of Eglinton-avenue and Yonge-street for \$100,000. The property has a frontage on Yonge-street of 100 feet by a depth of about 150 feet and on the lot are one or two small shops.

Another big deal put thru within the last day or two including the aforementioned lot, is the entire block running from Eglinton-avenue to Roshampton-avenue, a distance altogether of about 400 feet on Yonge, with a depth of 200. The year 50 feet will be subdivided and retained as a separate plan. Some idea of the value of Yonge-street in North Toronto will be gathered from the fact that the price paid runs up as high as \$40 down to \$25 a foot. In this, as in the other cases, it is said to be the intention of the purchaser to at once open up the property for sale. The names of the principals are withheld.

The prices paid are said to indicate a new high record in real estate values in North Toronto, and are significant as showing the trend of business expansion.

MAY SOON BE SEEDING.

"In a day or two, if the weather keeps as fine and warm as this, a number of the farmers in Scarboro Township will be busy at their spring seeding," said Simpson Kenzie, the well-known ex-farmer and agriculturist, to The World last night. Talking over the early advent of this spring as compared with others, Mr. Kenzie said that some 30 years ago in Scarboro Township the ground was practically finished by the end of March. About April 1 a snowstorm, followed by hard freezing weather, retarded the work. So hard was the ground frozen that a heavy wagon could be driven over the land without leaving a mark. On well underdrained land no harm came, however, the grain sown. History may repeat itself.

At about noon yesterday a big flock of wild geese passed over the head of the lake north of a sure harbinger of spring.

In most places there is little frost in the fields founded by wire fences, where little snow lodged, the ground is getting dry. Many of the concessions are dry and the sidewalks out in York County are dry and crusty, while others are the very reverse.
