YORK TOWNSHIP **POWER ENLARGED**

Private Bills Committee Gives Right to Regulate Buildings.

The powers of the Township of York over buildings on the outskirts of the City of Toronto, were extendthe private bills committee yesterday, when the majority of the clauses in the township's bill were passed. The clause giving the town-ship power to regulate the size and snip power to regulate the size and strength of walls was passed after discussion. J. R. L. Starr, counsel for the township, pointed out that a large population was growing up along the

It should have some authority to regulate buildings put up. Colin Campbell, M.L.A., asked if they were going to regulate farmers' barns and other buildings. "Give us credit for some sense." replied Mr. Starr.
Hon. I. B. Lucas pointed out that towns and villages had not this pow-

Hon. I. B. Lucas pointed out that towns and villages had not this power, and yet they were proposing to give it to a township. Mount Dennis had a population of 3000 living under township law, said Mr. Starr.

Mr. Lucas favored giving the township the same rights as towns, and this carried. G. H. Gooderham, M.L. A., argued that most of these suburbs growing up in the township would eventually be incorporated in the City of Toronto, and should be made to conform with its building regulations. Mr. Lucas principle was made to apply to the clause in the township bill regarding regulation of laundries. Thomas Hook, M.L.A., said in some instances laundries, which had been refused a license in Toronto, had moved across the street and set up in York.

The clause regarding fixed assessment for the Russell Motor Car Co. was passed after it had been explained that this was for the establishment of a bicycle and skate factory, to be erected, George S. Henry, M.L.A., in answer to a question as to whether the matter had been submitted to the people, explained that owing to the extent of the district only a small percentage of the voters would understand the issue. The matter had received the unanimous support of the council said Mr. Starr. The committee struck out the clause forbidding the remission of taxes to owners of vacant dwellings in the city limits. Such exemption was felt to be unfair to the farmers, explained Mr. Starr. They got no exemption, to their taxes if weather co litions spoiled their crops. quired.
The other clauses of the bill carrided with the exception of that regarding tax sales, which was to stand if Mr. Starr could convince the law clerk that there was no objection to it. This, members of the committee expressed the opinion, would be a rather hopeless task.
