BRITISH VISE CLOSES ON SCHWABEN LINE

Offensive Is Being Pressed With Sustained and Tireless Fury—British Gaining Ground All Along the Line.

FRENCH DRIVE ON AT STEADY PACE

Advance of Allies Appears Irresistible on Front of Somme.

PRISONERS INCREASE Foch's Army Takes Six Hundred Machine Guns in Latest Success.

ON THE FRENCH FRONT, Sept. 28, via Senlis, France.—The French troops, co-operating with the British, continue their advance and are driving the Germans out of villages and fortified positions both north and south of the Somme and frustrating all attempts at counter-attacks. The forward movement of the allied armies, although seemingly slow, appears to be irresistible. Since the offensive began on July 1, the French alone have recaptured on this front of the Somme 200 square kilometres of territory, their advance varying from 12 to 15 kilometres in depth over a front of about 20 kilometres. Besides this gain of ground, approximately 40,000 German prisoners have been taken by the French, while cannon numbering over 150 pieces, more than half of them heavy guns, have fallen into their hands. The machine guns taken by the French total more than 800 in this drive and dozens of others have been buried in the battered German trenches, together with their crews. The correspondent of The Canadian Press today went over the entire front of the German line and delivered a futile counter-attack in the neighborhood of Bouchevaux which cost them a heavy price in casualties and prisoners. The villages recently taken by the French were under constant the not heavy, artillery fire from guns of all calibres, but the French troops have been so well dismounted and the captured German works have been so well consolidated that very small damage was done.

GREEK NAVY IS UPSET CLIMAX DRAWS NEAR

ATHENS, Sept. 27, via London, Sept. 28.—The departure from Athens of Admiral Coundouriotis, besides causing a deep impression on the king, has completely upset the navy. The Greek battleship Hydra and two torpedo boats have left their anchorage with the Greek fleet and joined the allied fleet in Solomni Bay. The king called a conference of Premier Kalligeropoulos, General Moschopoulos, the chief of staff, Rear Admiral Panianos, the minister of marine and Nicholas Strathos, ex-minister of marine at the palace this morning to discuss the action to be taken in view of the silence of the entente powers, respecting Greece's proposal to join the allies, made thru the Greek ministers at the entente capitals ten days ago. BRITISH GET READY TO TAKE BAPAUME

Approach Objective Along Two Lines of Attack.

October Promises to Be Best Month Yet for the Allies.

BY ARTHUR S. DRAPER. Special Cable to The Toronto World. LONDON, Sept. 28.—Driving northward slowly, but relentlessly, the British are making ready for another surge toward Bapaume. They are moving forward along two lines of attack, one north of Thierval and the other north of Combles, seeking to pocket Bapaume, as Combles was pocketed. The battle continued in the past today. Haig's troops in another heavy attack won the greater part of a redoubt north of Thierval, overlooking the northern bank of Ancre. From this dominating position the ground that separates Haig's line from the Ancre can be shelled so effectively that its conquest will be comparatively easy. At the other end of the northern front the British are now less than half a mile from Le-Sars, which blocks the way along the Albert-Bapaume road. The Germans have made no feeble efforts at counter-attacks, for they are occupied chiefly in constructing new defences to withstand the next allied advance. To Stand at Bapaume. Fiercest fighting is certain to take place before Bapaume. The Germans will be strong in the position that objective and thence south to Sailly. The work preliminary to the new battle is being completed rapidly. With the odds always in favor of the defending force the British are confident. The smash that won Combles and Thierval showed the allied superiority. The execution done by Haig's artillery has caused great gratification in the British command.

The gunners were said by members of the Devonian's crew to have served on the British battleship Queen Elizabeth.
