# HAY-BOND TREATY KILLED

and Frozen Fish Are Only Products Freed.

Washington, Feb. 9 .- (Special.) - Presi dent Roosevelt will not be able to use the Bay-Bond treaty as an entering wedge for Canadian reciprocity. He believed that if reciprocity were established between the United States and Newfoundland it might serve as the means of bringing forward the advantage of reciprocity between the United States and Canada. For this reason he had the old Hay-Bond treaty remodeled and brought before the senate yesterday for action. It is clearly evident that the Hay-Bond treaty cannot be ratified at this session. Almost every senator is apprehensive that some product may be discovered in the case of Newfoundland which will compete with an industry in his own state. The admission of coal from Newfoundland has been eliminated from the treaty. # THE TORONTO WORLD

M. P. for Centre Toronto Said to Be a Certainty for the City Hall Vacancy.

The rumor connecting the name of E. F. Clarke, M. P., with the position recently vacated by R. J. Fleming at the city hall, has been revived and given much more prominence than is justified, if the expressed opinions of the members of the board of control are to be credited. The return of Mr. Clarke from Ottawa was made the occasion

Last night he was not as well as he had been, and sent out word that he did not feel able to answer the questions of a reporter in regard to his position in the matter.

Controller Ward stated yesterday that Mr. Clarke's name had not been discussed, to his knowledge, by any members of the board of control, and any report that he would favor the appointment was entirely unjustified.

One Conservative alderman, however, said last night that Mr. Clarke was a certainty; that he was tired of politics certainty; that he was tired of politics and was anxious to retire, and that le would be given a sort of supervising while James Forman would be made chief of the assessment department.


