The St. John schooner Mincola has been fixed to load general cargo from New York for Port-au-Prince at private terms. Furness steamship Evangeline moved over to the C. E. wharf, west side, today to receive her outward cargo. Schooner Foster Alice, Captain Winthrop, arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Turks Island, British West Indies, with 9405 bushels salt in bulk for deB Carriette. The American schooner Abbie C. Stubb has been fined \$200 for violating the customs law. The vessel entered this port and sailed again without reporting to the customs house. The new steamer Governor Cobb arrived from Boston via Esportport at 11 o'clock with 48 passengers and 148 tons of freight. The steamer made a very quick trip to this port. The Furness steamship Wyanadotte will sail from this port about the end of December for Cape Town, Port Elizabeth, East London and Durban. This steamer has refrigerators for meats, etc. A storekeeper on Chapel street has a vicious horse that is in the habit of biting at persons who pass by. Yesterday afternoon the animal made a snap at one of two elderly ladies, who were passing, and when she ran it pursued her for several steps. She fell and bruised herself considerably. Many similar complaints have been made about this horse. Last night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Reed, Market Place, W. E., was a gathering of about 30 friends, who came to Mr. Reed's home as a great surprise to both, it being Mr. Reed's fiftieth birthday. Mr. Reed made a suitable reply, and after refreshments had been partaken of the friends dispersed in the wee small hours of the morning.

FUNERALS The funeral of the late Samuel H. Abbott was held this morning at 10 o'clock from his late residence on south side of King Square to Lech Leonard, where interment took place. Rev. W. O. Raymond read the burial service at the house at 9.20 o'clock. The funeral of the late Albert Edward Mason was held this afternoon at three o'clock from his late residence, 199 Carmanthel street. Rev. Mr. McMaisters read the burial service at the house, and interment was made in Fernhill cemetery.

BODY OF MRS. SMITH FOUND Aged Woman Who it Was Thought Had Started for Windsor N. S.

PEABODY, Nov. 19.—The body of Mrs. Annie C. Smith, 76 years old, who wandered from her home on Nov. 8, and for whom a search was made by the local authorities, was found yesterday in an open field behind the poultry farm of F. G. Dikeman, near the Lynnfield line, about three-quarters of a mile from her home. The medical examiner decided that death was due to exhaustion. Mrs. Smith disappeared some time in the afternoon of the 8th, and that night a searching party was organized. The hunt continued for several days, extending for a radius of half a mile from her home. It was finally given up after more than a hundred persons had gone over the territory. The body was found today by Mr. Dikeman in an open field about 300 yards behind his poultry houses. It was in plain view from the tracks of the railroad to Reading. Mrs. Smith was a widow and leaves four sons and a daughter. Two of the sons live in East Boston, where the body will be brought today and prepared for transportation to her native town in Nova Scotia. There she will be buried by the side of her husband.

THE CO-ADJUTOR'S CONSECRATION Great Interest is Felt in the Event in Church Circles.

The consecration of Rev. Canon Richardson, co-adjutor bishop at Montreal on St. Andrew's day, has awakened great interest in the Episcopal church. Services will be held in nearly all the churches of the diocese at the hour named for the consecration. Several of the clergy and laity of the city will probably go to Montreal to attend the consecration. The bishop co-adjutor elect will probably go to Montreal several days in advance of this consecration, and in his absence Rev. Dr. Symonds, of the Cathedral in Montreal, will preach in Trinity church.
