## WM. FAVERSHAM IS ON IMPERIAL SCREEN

Another summer week was opened at Imperial yesterday when still one more notable star made his bow to St. John public. The No-Good-Guy greatly pleased all at the Gem last night and with a stirring comedy, "A Dash of Courage," provided an exceptionally good entertainment. ## MOVIE MEN BAND TO FIGHT HURTFUL LAWS

Alliance Representing \$500,000,000 Capital, Elects W. A. Brady President. A defensive alliance that represents an aggregate capital of \$500,000,000 in the "movies" was formed New York recently at the Hotel Astor in the name of the National Association of the Motion Picture Industry for the purpose of combating every political or legislative act regarded as prejudicial to their common interests. William A. Brady was elected president of the new organization. As a weapon in its fight the motion picture men have 30,000 screens for the expression of their views before gatherings of 20,000,000 people every day. Governors of states and candidates for that office, mayors of big cities and aspirants and others will be given opportunity to explain their opposition or support of motion pictures.
