# LIFTS CURTAIN ON BLOODY FIRST DAYS OF THE WAR

## Sir Conan Doyle's Tribute to Gallant British, Far Outnumbered, But Victors at Mons, Le Cateau, The Aisne and Ypres

The Toronto Globe says: Were it not that war losses are upon an ever-increasing scale as the terrible conflict approaches its climax, and that the mind has become accustomed to the killing or wounding of great masses of men as something which, although in peace, the statements made in Sir Conan Doyle's narrative of the first few months of the war as to the losses of the British expeditionary force in France would greatly shock the reader. The famous physician and novelist has entered upon what will probably prove his finest literary work with the intention of presenting the facts as verified from official sources, rather than a series of tales regarding the campaign. His history of the war, the first volume of which is published by Hodder & Stoughton, Toronto, under the title "The British Campaign in France and Flanders, 1914," is intended as a permanent record of the part taken by the British army in the greatest of all wars in which it has been engaged.

Sir Conan has devoted a large part of his time to the accumulation of evidence from first-hand sources as to the various happenings of these great days. In many cases his descriptions of the principal incidents have been submitted to the chief actors in the campaign, and have been corrected or endorsed. The British government has recently removed the restrictions which forbade the mention of particular battalions of the historic regiments of which the expedition was composed, and the use of the narrative for the first time we learn the fate of splendid bodies of men which were practically wiped out in resisting the first rush of the German invasion.

## Across Channel

The British expeditionary force crossed the Channel into France on the night of August 12 and 13, 1914. It consisted of approximately 90,000 men, 16,000 horses and 400 guns. Sir Conan states that within four months half of the men were either dead or in the hospitals. They were splendidly trained, for the most part excellent shots, and many of the officers and men had seen active service in South Africa and elsewhere. The great episodes of the campaign in which these regulars of the old army met their death were the battles of Mons, Le Cateau, the Marne and the Aisne, and the first defence of Ypres. Sir Conan shows that, except at the Marne, where a French rather than a British battle, the troops under command of Sir John French were faced by enormous numbers of the enemy, and the defeats they suffered were in reality victories, the glory of which will never fade.

## Mons and Le Cateau

At Mons official records show that a British army of 80,000 men was attacked in front by almost 200,000 Germans, while 40,000 more were thrown upon its left flank. The story of how French men evaded the trap, fought rearward actions day after day, and a pitched battle at Le Cateau, and yet were able after a ten days' retreat to turn the attack at the Marne, stirs the blood. So confident was Sir Conan that the British had the British army at his mercy that he sent an exultant telegram to Berlin, saying the British were marching, the people of the German capital hoisted their flags in honor of the event.

The battle of Le Cateau was fought by Smith-Dorrien with 70,000 weary and outnumbered men against 170,000 Germans, provided with an over-powering artillery, yet Smith-Dorrien extricated himself and the bulk of his army. The remnants were fearfully mauled. The 2nd Yorkshire Light Infantry lost twenty officers and 600 men that day, the 2nd Suffolk came out with but 250 men, while the German signal corps reported a tremendous toll of others. Many of the British guns ran short of shells, and a spectacle tells how he saw the British gunners, under heavy fire, sitting in gloomy groups round the guns, which they had fired their shells to work north to the heart to abandon.

## The Aisne

Sir Conan points out how much the Allies suffered from the artillery supremacy of the Germans, not only in the matter of heavy guns. Dealing with the battle of the Aisne, he says: "About this period both the British and French armies began to strengthen themselves with those heavy guns in which they had been so completely out-weighted by their enemy. On September 20 the French in the neighborhood of our lines received twelve long-range cannon firing a 35-pound shell a distance of 13,000 yards. Three days later the British opened fire with four new batteries of six-inch howitzers. From this time onwards there was no such great disparity in the heavy artillery, and the wounded from the monster shells of the enemy had at least the slight solace that their fate was not unavenged. The expenditure of shells, however, was still at the rate of ten German to one of the Allies. If the war was not won it was no fault of Krupp and the men of Peace. In two weeks the British lost nearly 8,000 men from shell fire."

## Ypres

To the height of his great subject Sir Conan rises completely in his description of the first battle of Ypres. In the supreme crisis of that battle, under the eyes of the Kaiser and supported by overwhelming artillery, the Germans failed to break the British lines. "The Second Queens had two officers and 90 men left that night, the Second Welsh all three officers and 40 men. Little groups who might have been fitted into a large-sized drawing-room were settling a contention on which the fate of the world might depend."

Of the losses of the British at Ypres Sir Conan speaks freely. The 10th Division was reduced from 12,000 infantry to 2,383, the Twenty-second Brigade came out of action with Brigadier Lawford, three officers and 700 men. "The losses of the brigade worked out at 97 per cent. of the officers and 80 per cent. of the men, figures which can seldom have been matched in the warfare of any age and yet were little in excess of the other brigades, as is shown by the fact that the whole division on November 7 numbered forty-four officers and 2,386 men. It is true that many British regiments in this campaign found themselves with not one single officer or man left who had started

The London Times, in quoting this and similar utterances calls attention to a collection of similar German utterances published by a Danish author, Dr. Bang, of the University of Copenhagen, and remarks:

"A large portion of the selections taken from sermons and other publications by German pastors. As we read them they are better able to understand how it is that German Lutheranism has not succeeded in making Germany Christian. Especially noticeable are the comparisons which repeatedly recur between the sufferings of Germany and the sufferings of Christ. This culminates in an article from Dr. Preuss of Erlangen, which appears in a German religious paper, expressing a close parallel between the suffering of the German people and the suffering of Germany in the present war."

What is to be hoped for from such people in the way of reason or fair play about other people until they get drilled into them by hard words the fact that this world is a place where both men and nations must not only live but let live?

These figures do not include tobacco used by smokers who roll their own cigarettes.

Records show that the government collected a tax of \$1.10 a gallon on 146,835,146 gallons of whiskey during the year a total of \$129,599,660 as compared with \$124,492,210 gallons and a tax yield of \$187,094,181 in 1915. Beer consumption, according to the record, was 1,866,518,070 gallons in 1916 as against 1,791,981,930 gallons the previous year. The tax yield on beer during 1916 was \$91,718,975; in 1915, \$86,798,808.

The total revenue to the government from whiskey, beer and cigarette sources was \$284,250,235 in 1916, an increase of \$86,118,289 over last year.

## Was Great Year For Lovers of Mountain Dew

More Whiskey Than in Any Year Since 1909 Drunk Last Year in United States

Washington, Jan. 27.—The amount of whiskey consumed by the American people in 1916 apparently was greater than in any previous year since 1909, according to the tax returns to the treasury department, and the handsome sum of nearly \$28,000,000 more than in 1915 is attributable to the fact that the government is at present collecting taxes on all the whiskey produced in the country, whereas, because of extensive frauds, such was not the case a few years ago.

Consumption of cigarettes in 1916 reached the highest mark ever recorded. The tremendous increase—more than 40 per cent over 1915—is attributed to two country and growth of the cigarette industry among women.
