MARKET DULL IN MONTREAL THIS MORNING

Prices Irregular With Smelters And Brazilian Only Outstanding Stocks

PRICE MOVEMENTS IN WALL STREET FUSED

Mack Trucks 13-4 Points Higher; Other Motor Stocks Lose Ground

MONTREAL, March 20.—Extreme dullness marked the first half hour's trading on the local exchange this morning and prices were irregular. The only stocks to display any activity were Consolidated Smelters and Brazilian Trac-tion. The former opened off 1/4 at 202 and then found back to 203 1/2. Brazilian was up a quarter at 90 1/2. Twin City was the only other stock to sell in a board lot sale and suffered a recession of 2 1/2 points at 70.

IN WALL STREET.

NEW YORK, March 20.—Fused price movements characterized the opening of today's stock market. With the exception of Mack Trucks, which opened 1 1/2 points higher, most of the motors lost ground on initial sales in apparent reaction of the liquidation of weakened marginal accounts. Jordan opened 1/4 lower, and Hudson yielded a half to 9 1/4, duplicating the year's low. Oil improved on the confirmation of reports that negotiations were pending for merger of the General Petroleum Corporation and the Standard Oil Company of New York.

Brokers' Opinions

NEW YORK, March 20.—Block Money—"While we think purely speculative stocks may be carried lower, and consequently affect the rest of the market, high grade issues insofar as one can take care of them, may now be bought but only in a conservative way." Bachelier—"It would seem that in any rally that materializes the securities which offered the greatest resistance in the last few days will be apt to score the greatest advance." Hornblower—"There is nothing wrong with the market beyond the fact that trend is downward and even extended reactionary moves have their rallies. Chance waiting for a rally before selling any more stocks." Pynchon—"While liquidation goes on some stocks will advance. We would take advantage of sharp reactions to pick up dividend paying oils and rails."

Current Events

NEW YORK, March 20.—Tidewater oil earned \$2.81 a share, against \$7.79 a share in 1924 on the 500,000 shares 100 par. The 1925 earnings are on 2,000,000 shares no par. Kelsey Wheel earned \$11.90, against \$4.49 in 1924. Lehigh Valley, in quarter ending Dec. 31 last, earned 27 cents a share, against \$1.42 in fourth quarter 1924. Dun's reports 392 commercial failures in the United States this week, against 491 last week, and 416 a year ago. Twenty industries 145.11, off 1.21; 20 rails 106.35, off .35. Breadstrees say bad roads, unseasonable weather and effects of recent moves on stock exchange have helped to slow up distributive trade, but wholesale lines are doing about as well as a year ago.

SAINT JOHN RETAIL TRADE IMPROVING

WINNIPEG, March 19.—The weekly trade report of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association, Limited, reads: "Hull—Not much improvement has been noticed in trade circles since our last report, but better conditions are looked for."

Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, March 20.—Last week after eight days of advancing prices, covering up processes on Saturday resulted in quite a decline. Similarly, after a week of declines, today is apt to bring considerable short covering and some rallies. There is no indication of any change in the character of the market, however. Yesterday afternoon in the last hour the shorts started to cover and they were able to get stock quite easily. The rally, consequently, lasted only a short time, and stocks closed very near the low prices of the day. A good many stocks are being

carried down to quite reasonable levels and in a few issues there is good buying. It is impossible for any stock to advance in markets such as we have been having. The trouble now is that a great many people would like to get out of stocks and are only waiting for a rally to do so. Consequently, while a rally is due, it will undoubtedly meet liquidation. We don't very much mind advances in the near future will hold. The market situation right now depends largely upon conditions in the motor industry. Motors have been leaders and their declines, based on rumors of curtailment in production, have been disappointing to the bulls. If the developments within the next few weeks result in further curtailment motors are going lower, but as various motor company officials have pointed out, reduction now is only temporary and the result of weather, which will change, the situation may be changed. There is nothing definite in the news yet as to which viewpoint is correct.
