

BOTH HOUSES DUE TO FIGHT RULES CHANGES

Bitter Contests Predicted in
United States Over
Legislation

MAY MODIFY
DEBATE IDEAS

Objection to All Alterations
in Existing Rules Cover-
ing Talk.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Aside from the inevitable scraps and squabbles to occur over legislation, two bitter battles of a purely domestic nature are due to be waged on Capitol Hill next winter when Congress convenes. Both the Senate and House are scheduled to engage in a heated controversy over existing methods of running their respective households. In the Senate, a fight is imminent over Vice-President Daves' proposal to modify the rule governing debate. Republican leaders in the House are intent on repealing changes in rules forced through during the last Congress by Independents.

Time Limit on Debates
Since Daves started his campaign for a tightening-up of Senate procedure only a small group of Senators have announced they would support his proposal to set a time limit on debate. Daves believes unlimited debate encourages filibustering and other dilatory tactics. Sen. Moses, N. H. President Pro Tempore has come out openly against any alteration in existing rules covering debate.

Some observers here believe a compromise may be reached in the Senate by which Senators in the future will be required to address themselves to the subject matter under consideration. Under existing rules speeches can be made on any subject without regard to pending business.

REQUIRE 200 NAMES
House leaders expect considerable opposition to reverting back to the old method of requiring 200 names to be attached to a petition for discharging a committee from further consideration of a bill, but are confident they can effect the change. The Republicans have a clear majority of about 25 in the next House, excluding Independents.

In the last Congress Independents blocked organization and forced through an amendment which permitted a motion to discharge a committee to be made on the petition of 100 members. Independents contended that procedure prevented committees from "killing" legislation in which many members were interested.

The Howell-Barkley Bill, abolishing the Railroad Labor Board, was called up under this procedure. Republican leaders presented its passage. This was the only measure considered under the change effected by Independents.

BLUEBERRIES START IN LARGE QUANTITY

Seven Crates in Yesterday—
New Potatoes and Other
Produce Arrive.

Seven crates of blueberries, the largest shipment to the city date from upriver points this season, were brought to local dealers on the steamer Majestic yesterday and sold for between 16 and 18 cents per box. One crate of black raspberries, some red raspberries, black varieties selling at 20 cents the box, 40 crates of strawberries, 64 crates of new potatoes and a quantity of green peas and beans, chicken eggs, butter and cabbage also arrived on the Majestic.

The steamer Hampton had a cargo consisting of 40 crates of strawberries, 70 bushels of new potatoes, 14 bushels of turnips and 10 large bags of peas.

To Try Channel Swim

DOVER, England, July 23.—Gertrude Ederle, the American swimmer, has completed her training for an attempt to swim the English Channel. Miss Ederle departed for Boulogne Wednesday and will await favorable conditions to make her attempt from the French coast.

PITTSBURG'S POLICE ARE RUSHED TO QUELL REPUTED RACE RIOT

PITTSBURG, July 23.—Five riot calls were received early tonight by the police to quell what was said to be a riot between whites and negroes in an outlying section of the city. Fifteen policemen sent out on the first call were reinforced by a score of others and detectives.

With the arrival of police, who were armed with riot guns and night sticks, the fighting factions dispersed. Police said there were at least 300 fighting when they arrived. Bricks from nearby building operations furnished the principal ammunition of the mob. Hundreds watched the fight from a safe distance. There were four arrests.

11 CONGREGATIONS OUT OF THE UNION

In Manitoba 524 Churches De-
cided to Remain in New
Organization.

WINNIPEG, July 23.—Voting on Church Union in every place in Manitoba may now be considered concluded. United Rev. J. A. Cornie, secretary of the United Church committee today, asserted, will have 222 congregations, of which 440 took a vote for or against the United Church. The remainder entered without a vote. The congregations which had voted out of union number eleven, to which, he stated, may be added the three or four congregations which may be formed in Winnipeg.

BEAR WAR STARTS

Farmers at French Vale, N. S.,
Search District For Sheep
Killers.

SYDNEY, N. S., July 23.—Squads of armed farmers are scouring the country around French Vale, 17 miles from Sydney, bent on a war of extermination against bears which have killed a large number of sheep and lambs during the past few days.

Bears, large and small, have been reported from various points within the past ten days. Robert Jardine, a leading sheepman, found one tearing up the grass on his front lawn, and set a deadfall weighted with two tons of stone. The cunning bears extracted the bait and sprang the trap, leaving behind nothing except a handful of hair. Signs indicate the presence of at least sixteen bears.

EARL HAIG GREETED

Receives Welcome, Inspects
Vets, Opens Rooms at
Twin Cities.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., July 23.—Earl Haig was given an enthusiastic reception in Port Arthur and Port William today. At both Port William and Port Arthur he was welcomed by civic officials and the Great War Veterans, whose ranks he inspected, and opened their clubrooms.

BORDER SEARCHED

Three Wanted For Killing—
Mount Vernon Police
on Trail.

MOUNT VERNON, N.Y., July 23.—The Canadian border is being combed for trace of the three robbers who shot and killed two West Chester Electric Railway employees in a trolley car hold-up near here on Monday. Chief of Police Atwell believes the bandits have headed in the direction of the international boundary and today he has directed that search be concentrated in that vicinity.

The state and federal authorities have joined forces in the man-hunt, but chief Atwell declared that the trail is being found cold.

R. S. Cummins, Yorktown, Ind., and Mrs. Cummins and two young sons, arrived in the city yesterday in their commodious yellow auto home en route home after a few weeks' tour of the Maritimes. The party has covered about 8,000 miles since leaving home four weeks ago and yesterday covered the 100-mile trip from Moncton to here in 8 hours. The car, Mr. Cummins said, is capable of attaining a speed of 50 miles an hour. It is fitted with all the comforts of home. The party expects to leave for Calais either today or tomorrow on their way home.

3 CONVICTS LASHED

Unlikely to Walk For 10 Days
at St. Vincent De Paul
Penitentiary.

MONTREAL, July 23.—Three convicts in St. Vincent De Paul Penitentiary are in the prison hospital today suffering from the effects of the lash yesterday, and are not likely to walk for another 10 days.

James Miller and William Martin, convicted of robbery with violence, received 10 and five strokes respectively. They must receive another similar installment before their release.

Henri Dumont, convicted of statutory offence against a young married woman, received the first 10 of the 80 strokes which he was sentenced to in addition to his two years' term.

ARGENTINE WANTS
MORE SETTLERS
Plan Proposed to Expropriate
Land For Colonization
Purposes.

Buenos Aires, July 23.—Among the most important legislative projects which Congress will consider this year, is included a project sponsored by the Minister of Agriculture providing for the expropriation of agricultural lands for colonization purposes.

The Colonization Bill proposes to authorize the executive to proceed directly, or in association with railway companies or other third parties, to sell or rent lands in lots for agricultural and stock-raising purposes, of suitable area in determined zones.

Effect the necessary improvements for the purpose of the law.

Establish and promote credit, co-operation and other measures for the stimulation of colonization.

Another article authorizes the executive to issue internal or external bonds or complete any other credit operation up to a total of \$100,000,000 annually, to make use of the product of mortgage on lands acquired for colonization of the revenues proceeding from the application of the law and of rentals derived from fiscal lands.

In the Minister of Agriculture's opinion the economic and social development of the population and the solution of financial difficulties of the future depend upon a rapid increase of the population as a result of immigration, but not even immigration will have the desired result unless the difficulties standing in the way of colonization are removed.

There must be a permanent and definite access to the land to all workers who desire and know how to cultivate it.

It is stated that if the bill becomes law there would be a voluntary co-operation on the part of landowners, railways and others interested, that expropriation is unnecessary, and that the land offered will always be in excess of the possibilities of colonization.

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THORNTON TO TOUR

Leaves Montreal on Saturday
to Inspect The Prairie
Lines.

MONTREAL, July 23.—Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, will leave Montreal Saturday of this week on an extended tour of inspection of western lines, which will include several of the new branch lines which have recently been constructed.

On this trip he will be accompanied by Major G. A. Bell, Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals, and J. Gill Gardner, of Rockville, Ont., director of the Canadian National. After arriving at Winnipeg, officers of the western region will join the inspection party and various divisional officials will be picked up from time to time along the route.
