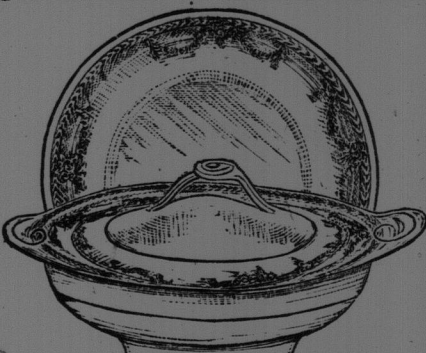

## FRANK FALES IS DEAD AGED 65

Prominent in Business, Life and Formerly Active in Societies

Was Identified With Pythians, Masons, Foresters and Other Organizations

Frank Fales, 65 years of age, son of the late Amos Fales and descendant of a section of the United Empire Loyalists who settled in Nova Scotia, a manufacturer's agent widely known throughout the Maritime Provinces and in Upper Canada through his connection with British firms, died at the home of his wife, Mrs. Annie A. Fales, daughter of the late W. H. Bell, and sister of W. H. Bell, of King street east, piano dealer. Surviving children are: Harry A. B. Ralph H. and Frank S. of Frank Fales & Sons, Ltd.; Mrs. W. G. Estabrook, 40 Seely street, and Mrs. Robert H. Gilmore of Halifax. There are five grandchildren. Mr. Fales, though kept mostly to an invalid's chair, fulfilled much of the accounting duties of his firm and his particularly alert mind kept him in almost immediate touch with the business world and a large circle of acquaintances.

### BUSINESS CAREER

Beginning his business career as a salesman for the Parks Cotton Mill industry as a very young man, Mr. Fales later assumed territorial agencies for several prominent manufacturers in Great Britain, notably in lines catering to the requirements of deep-sea fishermen, a basic industry in the Maritime Provinces.

Fraternally and in other avenues of constructive citizenship, Mr. Fales was an enthusiastic upholder. When the Pythian order was introduced into Canada through the late John Beamish and the mother lodge, New Brunswick No. 1, of this city, Mr. Fales identified himself with the movement. He was a past chancellor of this parent British lodge, and in Masonic circles held the distinction of being the oldest past master of New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22. In his younger days he was a very active and prominent member. He was a member of New Brunswick Lodge for 37 years, and a past master of the lodge since 1900. He was also a Forester, a member of Court La Tour. When a body of public-spirited citizens banded themselves together to co-operate with the volunteer fire department in the old days, Mr. Fales was an energetic member of this new salvage corps, a branch of the city's protective service ever since.

### BROUGHT FIRST BIKE

The realm of sport also had its appeal for Mr. Fales. It used to be one of his jocular claims that he brought to Saint John the first high bicycle, one of which was for the late Arthur Hazen, later manager of the Bank of British North America, and one for himself, to keep Mr. Hazen company, he said. Mr. Fales also was an enthusiastic curler, and was one of a group of enthusiasts who instituted the doughty Thistles, later so formidable in Maritime tournaments.

### A BAPTIST

Throughout long confinement to his room he maintained a cheerful mind. It was his particular delight to recount exploits of early days with old friends in religion he was a Baptist, a member of Central church. Prior to the merger of Brunswick street Baptist church with Leinster street church—now known as Central—Mr. Fales acted as treasurer for the older body in Brunswick street. His funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon.

## MANY GATHER TO HEAR RESULT

Crowds Given Election Returns From Times-Star Building

Telegraph-Journal Issued Two Extra Editions Telling of Battle of Ballots

With icy winds sweeping around them anxious voters gathered in Canterbury street in front of the office of The Times-Star and The Telegraph-Journal last night to hear election returns as they were announced from this newspaper office. As the news came over the wires from all parts of Canada it was announced by megaphone by Steve Matthews.

While it was a changing crowd, some remained a long time, keyed up by interest in the battle of ballots. The polls in Saint John had only been closed but a few minutes when the first of the crowd took up their places to await the announcement of the results.

### ELECTION EXTRAS

The Telegraph-Journal issued two election extras. In the first the Conservative victory in Saint John-Albert was detailed and the general trend of the province voting indicated.

This was followed a little later by a second extra giving further particulars in the Maritimes and other parts of the Dominion and by still another with news of the voting from points farther west as those poles were reported.

By 10:45 it had become so cold that the crowd had dwindled to a few score of people and they could be accommodated inside the office. The invitation to come inside was very quickly accepted and the special service of the special trunk line telephones of the newspaper office was being kept hot as the bombardment of inquiries continued with unrelenting persistence. Many of the inquiries were from remote parts of the province.

Not until the small hours of the morning had the telephone fusillade died down to a few calls from the terribly keen politicians who could know no rest until they had a definite idea of how the parties would stand.

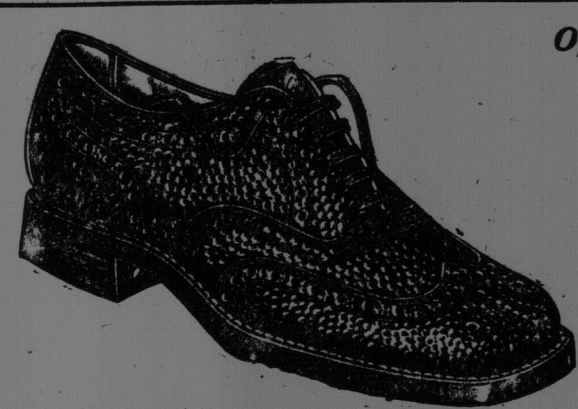
