Newburyport dropped two games to Fredrickton yesterday. The first ended 4-3 and the second 3-2.

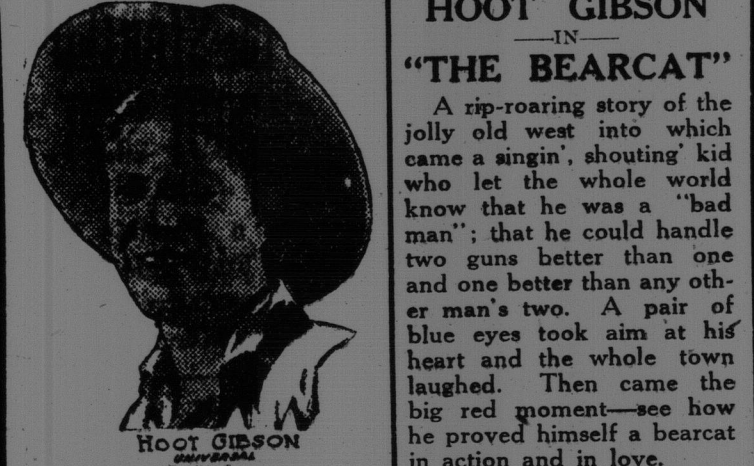

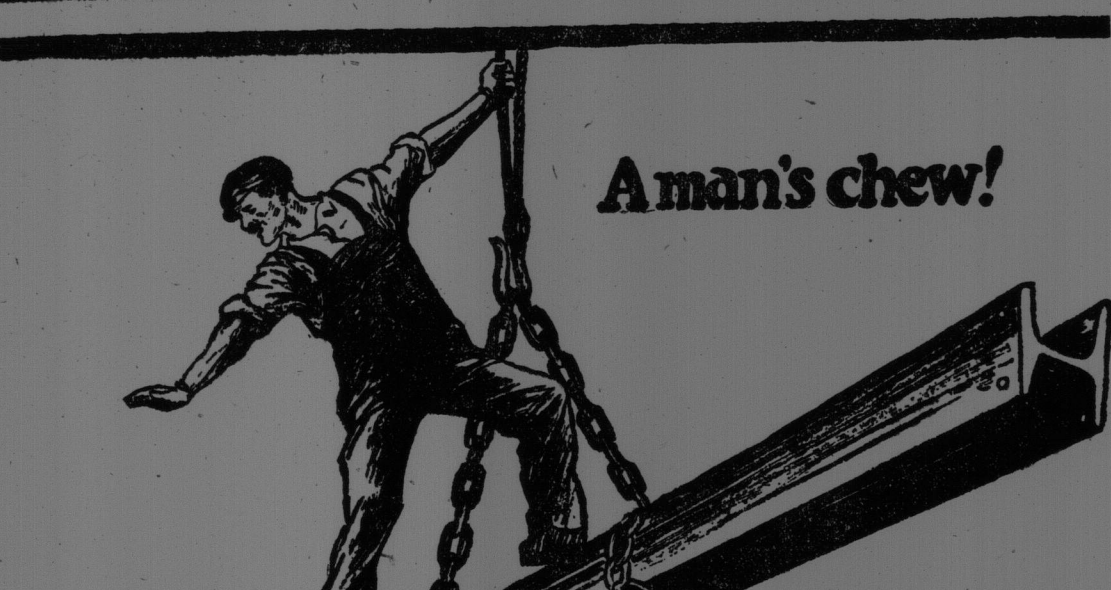

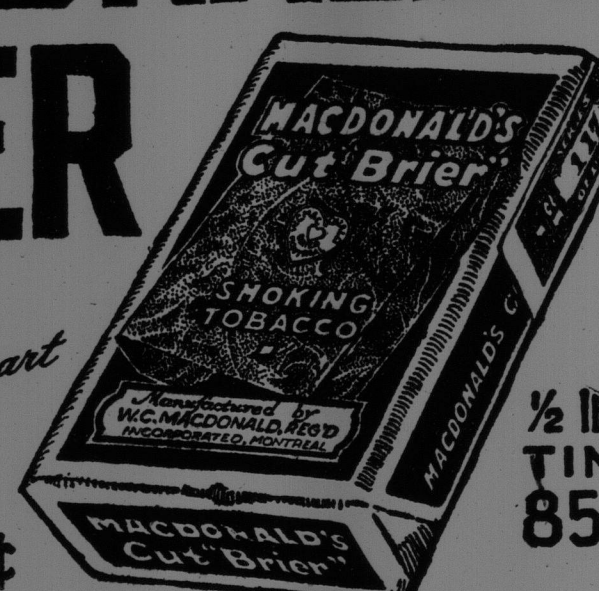
