UNITED STATES BOUGHT

TWO-THIRDS OF BONDS

ISSUED IN CANADA IN 1920

New York, March 21.—(By Canadian Press) Of the total Canadian bond sales of \$224,914,697 in 1920 more than two-thirds, or \$228,064,000 were bought by the Bankers Trust Company of New York, the total value of Canadian fish and fish products marketed reached \$29,200,000 in a single year. That was in 1918, when the world's demand for food was intensified by the war situation.

Canada was enabled to be of service in the food crisis through possession, among other things, of perhaps the most extensive fishing waters in the world. The foremost lobster fishing industry in the world is carried on along the whole of the eastern coast of Canada.

The eastern coast line and bays, Gulf of St. Lawrence and other ocean waters, aggregating not less than 200,000 square miles in area, comprise four-fifths of the fishing grounds of the North Atlantic. In 1907, according to the Bankers Trust Company, \$47,145,000 was invested in the Canadian fisheries. By 1917 the amount had increased to \$90,221,000.

COMMENT ON PROPOSED CESSATION OF ANTILLES TO THE UNITED STATES

Buenos Aires, March 21.—La Epoca, the government organ, comments editorially on the proposal of United States Senator Willis that Great Britain and France should part of their debt to the United States by ceding their island possessions in the Antilles to that country, saying:

"If this proposal is carried to a finish, North American dominion in the Antilles sea will be absolute. Will this operation be realized? For Mr. Willis, it appears, the purchase of a country is exactly the same thing as the purchase of a house."

NEW LIMBS FOR SOLDIERS.

Albany, N. Y., March 21.—Artificial limbs should be provided at least every three years by the state to members of the militia who have a leg wounded in the service of the state, so Assemblyman Joseph A. V. McKee believes. He has placed before the legislature for its consideration a bill carrying an appropriation of \$5,000, so that the artificial limbs can be given to disabled men.

OFFERS COW TO HARDING.

Washington, March 21.—A cow has been offered President Harding by an Illinois man who in a letter received at the White House said it was his hobby "to raise very good Jersey cows and to place them where they will be most appreciated." During the Taft regime, "Pauline," prize Guernsey, furnished milk for the White House table.

Ottawa, March 21.—(Canadian Press) The question of profits from canteens overseas, and Canada's share in them, will probably be taken up by the parliamentary committee on pensions and re-establishment this session.

Paris, March 21.—Sedan chair motor side cars are the latest vehicles on the boulevards. The chair is a picturesque replica of the chair of former days, save that the poles are missing. At the corners are hung small lanterns lighted at night by electricity. The chair is complete from the fine lace curtains of the side windows to the initials of the owner on the door.

EX-CROWN PRINCE LONELY.

London, March 21.—Former Crown Prince Frederick William is reported "dying of boredom" in Wieringen, which he terms "the dreariest place on earth." He has written to an industrial magnate in South Germany, appealing to his influence to have him transferred to some more cheerful place.

Gem as Monkey Tooth.

Kansas City, Mo., March 21.—A piece of expensive dentistry was committed on Nellie, pet monkey belonging to J. W. Baker of Wichita. Mr. Baker's brother, a dentist, inserted a genuine diamond in the monkey's mouth to take the place of a lost tooth. The job cost several hundred dollars.

BOUGHT STILL FOR 5 CENTS.

Titusville, Fla., March 21.—Haunting, thirty memories of \$5,000 worth of moonshine liquor it had produced, hung around a captured still sold here at public auction. Yet it was knocked down completely by the sheriff to the lone bidder at 5 cents to enter on a non-beverage career.

DRESS CENSOR IN PARIS.

Paris, March 21.—An elderly duenna has been added to the staff at the French ministry of foreign affairs to exercise control over the dresses worn by typists and women secretaries, complaint having been made that these young people wear frocks too gaily designed for the solemnity of their surroundings.

BIG GAS FLOW.

Chatham, Ont., March 21.—A gas well on the property of the Vacuum Gas Co. in Dover township, which was shot late on Saturday afternoon, produced a flow at the rate of 800,000 cubic feet a day.
