
HEAD OF NEW LABOR APPEAL BOARD NAMED

Judge F. C. MacLennan, of Montreal, Appointed Chairman of New Court.

Ottawa, Sept. 16—Judge F. C. MacLennan, of Montreal, has been appointed chairman of the labor appeal board of five members recently constituted by order-in-council. The other members of the board, Messrs. Duggan and Franc, of Montreal, and Parsons and Bruce, of Toronto, representing both capital and labor, were appointed some time ago. The board's function is to provide a final court of arbitration and conciliation in cases where a strike or lockout has not been averted by the award of a board of arbitration and conciliation under the Industrial Dispute Act.

SERBIANS CARRY MOST IMPORTANT PART OF FRONT

London, Sept. 16—A Serbian official statement issued here tonight gives the captures by the Franco-Serbian forces at Vretnik, Dobropole, and Solai, which is the most important part of the Macedonian front.

MURDERED MAN WHO HAD ARRESTED HIM

Foreigner Also Fires at Another, Then Escapes to Woods.

Ottawa, Sept. 16—Carleton Wallen, aged forty-eight years, employed by the C. P. R., as a section hand, was murdered two miles east of Carleton Place around 8:30 this morning by an unknown foreigner, whom he and Thomas Nattingley, section foreman, had placed under arrest charged with breaking into the section house. The murderer also fired several shots at Nattingley who was unarmed, which missed their mark, and then took to the bushes, and is believed to be headed in this direction.

Ham Destroyed By Infernal Machines

French Army Headquarters, Sept. 17—Ham, the largest town in the devastated country which the Germans spared in their retreat, was visited with destruction even more complete and less justifiable than Noyon, which they methodically destroyed by fire. When the inhabitants were evacuated infernal machines were placed in the houses and fired started by pressing buttons miles away.

Save for the blowing up of the bridges Ham had not suffered previously by shell fire, neither side being interested in bombarding the place. The only excuse the Germans could make, that it blocked the roads against pursuit, is invalid. The destruction of the bridges alone made it impossible for the French to enter the town until they had been replaced.

James R. Creed, horseman, whose stock farm and horse boarding establishment on Union Turnpike, Jamaica, L. I., was known throughout the country, died at St. Mary's Hospital, Jamaica, after an illness of several days from pneumonia.

At the regular meeting of the Young Women's Christian Association board of directors yesterday afternoon plans were arranged for having a canvass of the city made in order to find suitable places for girls to board and for organizing gymnasium classes during the winter. LINA CAVALIERI AT IMPERIAL THEATRE

Apologia, Sept. 16—The death of Mrs. Fannie Sharp, widow of Isaac Sharp, took place on Saturday after a long illness. She would have reached her ninetieth year on November 8, and had spent the last four and a half years bedridden.

She is survived by two step-daughters, Mrs. John Sharp and Mrs. William Bell, of St. John, also two step-sons, Dr. Clarence Sharp, of Montreal, and Albert Sharp, of Sussex.

Charles Barnett of Richibucto, died last Thursday after a brief illness. He was sixty-three years of age and is survived by two brothers and one sister.

Mrs. Robert Carter, Sr., of Tweddle Brook, Kent County, passed away recently after a short illness. She was in the eighty-first year of her age and is survived by her husband, three sons and three daughters.
