

More Than 125 Bouts on New Year's Day

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 10.—The Australians may have their "Boxing Day" for big turnouts of fight fans, but the Yankees can boast of their New Year's afternoon as the greatest boxing day of the year and January 1st, 1914, was the banner New Year's day of all time for the boxing fans and boxers. There was hardly a city of any note in the country that could not boast of a boxing show on that day—some of them near championship battles. A conservative estimate places the number of shows held in the various big centres at thirty-eight. In most of these places there were from three to four and in some instances five bouts on each card, making a total of more than 125 contests in the one day. There were numerous knockouts registered, the most notable being that of Arthur Pelkey by Gunboat Smith in fifteen rounds; Bud Anderson by Leach Cross in eight and Jack Redmond by Ad Wolgast in five. On the same day in far away Australia Eddie McGooty handed Dave Smith the K. O. in just one minute and sixteen seconds, the second time that Eddie turned the trick on the Australian inside of one round. For some time the friends of Dave Smith in Australia have been having quite an argument as to who was heavyweight champion of the Antipodes. Dave claimed the crown because of his defeat of Bill Lang, who held the title, but who had been beaten by Sam McVey. However, under the new rules McVey could not hold the championship, but the matter was settled for a time at least by Eddie McGooty, a Wisconsin middleweight putting Mr. Smith to sleep in one round. Of course Eddie can claim the title while he is resident in Australia, but when he leaves there the championship will revert to Smith. McGooty also won the light heavyweight title with it, and he also lays claim to the middleweight championship of the world, which is disputed by Jimmy Clabby, Jack Dillon, George Chip and Mike Gibbons.

The Grand Circuit

Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 10.—Before leaving for Grand Rapids, Mich., where they will attend the annual meeting of the Grand Circuit stewards on next Tuesday, President H. K. Devereaux and secretary H. J. Klein announced that no new members are likely to be taken into the circuit this year. Unless there is an eleventh hour development, neither Providence, R. I., nor Readville, Mass., will be represented at the meeting and Peoria, Ill., has withdrawn its application. Much uncertainty exists regarding the eastern end of the circuit. Only two meetings are certain, Syracuse, N. Y., in the week of August 31 and Hartford, Conn. in the week of September 6. These are arbitrary dates, and from these points the stewards will work in an effort to mold the other members into a satisfactory circuit. Whether or not New York will be granted dates is still doubtful. Columbus, Ohio, and Lexington, Ky., will each have two successive weeks of racing. It is regarded as likely now that the first meeting will open in Detroit on Saturday, July 4 and run ten days. Either Kalamazoo or Grand Rapids would follow, and then Cleveland.
