King George Does Not go in For
Books—Literary News of Old
Country—Strange Societies in
Existence Under Insurance Act

(Times Special Correspondence)
London, Nov. 28.—In all King George's domain there is said to be no more voracious reader than his consort, Queen Mary. In spite of the innumerable demands on her time, Her Majesty manages to read most of the novels of today that really count, and almost always has a serious work in hand, too, such as a book of biography or one devoted to science or travel.
But the queen does not choose her reading herself. The business of selecting it is left to the Librarian of Windsor, who is the Hon. "Jack" Fortescue, who is the author of several books. Since 1906 Mr. Fortescue has been Librarian at Windsor Castle, and he went to India with the royal pair and wrote the official account of the Durbar, which was severely "rousted" by the newspapers on account of its author's tendency to dilate on the color of ceremonial carpets and the length of court trains to the exclusion of more human details.
However, there was some excuse for Mr. Fortescue, for it is hard to imagine a more thankless job than writing about a ceremonial with a whole battery of royal and official blue pencils ready to pounce on the slightest "indiscretion," or disclosure of what went on behind the scenes.
One reads every now and then that Queen Mary has accepted a copy of "So-and-so's" book, but whether she ever reads it or not depends on Mr. Fortescue. Every week he sends her a list of works which he believes she will enjoy reading, including suggestions about books for the royal children, and it is hard to say whether the queen and her young ones, all of whom are little princesses, are inclined to be bookworms.
Nor is Mr. Fortescue's job an exceptional one. There always has been a Librarian at Windsor, and he has his work cut out to keep up with the literary appetites of the queen and her young ones, all of whom are little princesses, are inclined to be bookworms.

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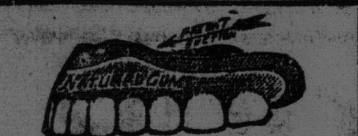

CONTROL OF PACIFIC

Must Ultimately be in Hands of Canada, Australia and New Zealand

Wellington, N. Z., Nov. 28.—Premier Massey, speaking at Auckland, said New Zealand's annual contribution to the navy amounted to a quarter of a million pounds, inclusive of battleship payments, but if these payments were completed tomorrow, he said the annual contribution would not be decreased.
The overseas dominions should increase their contributions, and the ultimate control of the Pacific must be in the hands of Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

LATEST FROM WAR

Sofia, Nov. 28.—The Bulgarian and Turkish plenipotentiaries assembled at ten o'clock this morning to discuss further the terms of the proposed armistice.
A letter today from the front declares that there has not yet been any real assault by the Bulgarian besiegers of the fortress of Adrianople. The forts, it says, have been shelled and some of them captured by the allied Serbians and Bulgarians, who suffered heavy loss. On one occasion a Turkish fort was captured and soon afterward the allies were compelled to evacuate it, owing to the heavy fire from the fortress.
On another occasion an entire Bulgarian battalion was destroyed by the explosion of a land mine, which was fired by the Ottoman defenders.
Belgrade, Serbia, Nov. 28.—The Serbian war office is continuing its military preparations on the Austrian frontier in readiness for possible eventualities. The government has received a denial of the report that the Serbian troops had occupied the port of Durazzo on the Adriatic Sea, according to the newspapers here. Premier Peticich has decided to leave for Laskop, Macedonia, today.

THREE CORNERED FIGHT FOR EDMONTON MAYORALTY

All Candidates in Favor of \$12,000,000 Expenditure in 1913
—Tax is on Ground Values Only

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 28.—Edmonton is in the thick of a lively three-cornered mayoralty contest. The candidates are William Short, K. C., formerly mayor, who framed the present charter which gives the city the widest possible latitude for self-government; William J. Magrath, retired millionaire land owner, who favors extensive improvements under the slogan "Fair play and a square deal for everybody"; and Alderman Joseph A. Clarke, formerly of the Yukon country, known among his friends as "the insurgent of the council" and "watch dog of the city." Two thousand voters, of a total electorate of 17,000 are eligible to vote at the election on December 9.
The city already has \$14,000,000 invested in its public utilities, which are owned and operated by the municipality. The three candidates are in favor of expending \$12,000,000 during the season of 1913. This will mean the most active building season in the history of the city and of western Canada. Edmonton derives its revenue from a tax on ground values only, the rate being twelve mills.
The Journal, a conservative newspaper, and the Bulletin, a liberal organ, owned by Hon. Frank Oliver, secretary of the interior under Sir Wilfrid Laurier, are supporting Mr. Short, the Capital, liberal, in which Mr. Clarke is said to be a stockholder, is pledged to Mr. Magrath, and Town Topics, a weekly chronicle of local events distributed free of charge, is backing Mr. Clarke's candidacy. The Mirror, edited by Gertrude Baines Watt, and the French and German journals have not yet committed themselves editorially.
