Ottawa, Nov. 1.—(Special).—According to reports received by the N. T. R. commission two-thirds of the construction work on the Winnipeg-Moncton section of the new line has been completed. At the end of October rails had been laid on 124 miles out of the 184 miles which comprise this part of the system. Construction has not been commenced on the Abitibi section owing to the impossibility of getting in supplies until other sections are completed.

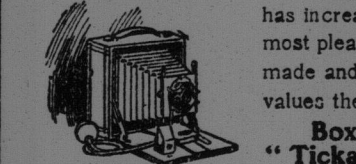
