Irish Peer a Bankrupt Civilian Chief of British Army His Opinions as Peculiar as His War Record - Noble Suffragette Cannot Qualify For Marjorie's Crown

Lord Ashton, who has just landed in the Bankruptcy Court, after ten years war with his Irish tenants, must not be confounded with Lord Ashton, the multi-millionaire linen manufacturer.

The Irish lord is not likely to receive much sympathy from any of his fellow countrymen on either side of the Atlantic, for he bears a name and title excoriated by all those who have at heart the Irish Nationalist cause.

Up to 1790 the Dublin Parliament was strongly opposed to the act of Union with England, by which the Emerald Isle lost its legislative autonomy which the present administration is solemnly committed to restore to her after the lapse of 122 years.

By 1790, however, the intrigues and bribes of Lord Castlereagh among the members of the Irish Commons had begun to have their effect, and finally, just before the debate of January 22 of that year, an amendment to the address to the throne was moved by Mr. Ross, maintaining the "undoubted birthright of the Irish to have a resident and independent legislature," it was eventually defeated by a single vote.

That vote, which virtually sealed the doom of the Irish Parliament, was cast by Frederick Trench, who in the debate had delivered a speech announcing his determination to vote in favor of the amendment.

There were some who insisted that the explosion was engineered by Lord Castlereagh, who was then in London, and who had himself for the purpose of averting the withdrawal of the constabulary, and as he naturally resented this imposition, he became involved in all sorts of costly lawsuits.

It is difficult to see what Lady Constance has accomplished beyond showing the harmlessness of artificial feeding - admitting over the lip of the physician a serious form of heart disease. The extraordinary feature of the affair is that a woman of birth and refinement, daughter of a Peer who ruled India as Viceroy, who did as Ambassador in Paris, and was known in England at least as the peeress "Owen Meredith," should so demean herself for the supposed support of a cause and in England at least, has been derided utterly hopeless, greatly by the violence and silliness of its advocates.

Daily Hints For the Cook

RADISH SALAD

Slice as many radishes as needed, lay them on a bed of lettuce. Place around the radishes any greens that are left over from previous salads and serve cold with a French dressing.

HOW TO PEEL ONIONS WITHOUT CUTTING

Cover the onion with cold water and hold both onion and knife under water while peeling—Woman's World.

HOW TO PEEL TOMATOES QUICKLY

Have on the stove a pan of boiling water. Put ripe tomatoes into wire basket and lower them into the water. Leave them in the water one minute, remove and skin them with a sharp knife.

WAFLES WITH PEAS

Boil the peas until tender, or use left-over peas, and drain until very dry, then mix through a strainer. Pour a cupful of boiling milk into a cup of strained peas, adding a generous tablespoonful of butter. When the mixture gets cool, add two eggs, yolks and whites beaten separately. Add a cup of baking powder sifted with a cup of flour. If too thin, add more flour. Beat in buttered walrus; sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve hot with maple syrup.
