"Dr. Frank J. Sexton, of the famous Brown University battery of Sexton and Tenney of the early nineties, was last night announced as next year's baseball coach at Harvard. After pitching on the Brown team, which he captured in '92 and '93, Sexton played with the Boston Nationals one year. In 1895-6, and 1901-02, he coached the University of Michigan baseball team, turning out champion teams. He coached the Brown team of 1903, and which won the championship. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania medical school in 1898 and has since been practicing in Brookline."

Dr. Sexton will be remembered by old baseball fans here, as having played for a time with the old Shamrocks of this city.
