TREAT TO SAILORS TONIGHT
This evening the Seamen's Institute will take place the occasion of all this month annual Christmas treat for the sailors. Recorder J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., will be in the chair. An address will be given by the Rev. Robert Armstrong, of Trinity church. Light refreshments will be served and more than 400 comfort bags distributed.

MARKET STANDS SOLD.
The market stands recently disposed of the stands in the market which had been sold by Mr. Potts, but from which the tenants were removed. This morning Archibald Belyea and Wallace Babkirke, who were removed to the lower end of the building, were sold stands in the upper portion, where they were before. Charles Landers and James McDonald were sold most in the butcher's section. The buyers pay a certain sum a month and hold the stands until the annual sale of the stands in May next.

CLAIMS \$800.85.
In the probate court today in the matter of the estate of Mary Shea, spinster, a further hearing was had upon the proof of claim filed by Julia Lane, which was contested, and which by consent was referred to the judge of the probate court for decision. The deceased lived with James Lane for more than three years before her death and paid her board. The claim is that of his wife for \$800.85 for nursing and special during this period. After hearing the evidence of the husband and wife, further hearing was adjourned until Thursday, Jan. 5, T. C. McKeen, the advocate for the administrator; J. A. Barry advocate for the claimant.

A MOCK TRIAL.
A severe sentence was meted out last night to Wm. V. Brody, on his being tried, rested and found guilty, in a mock trial of stealing from the rooms of the Father Mathew association, a riding whip, valued at 37 cents. It was after a meeting of the association, held in their rooms, St. Malachi's hall, that the prisoner was arrested on the charge before His Honor, L. A. Conlon, who, after several witnesses had been examined on both sides, found the defendant guilty, and sentenced him to reformatory for a period of three months. The proceedings were interesting, and the court was filled with interested spectators. Wm. Harrington acted as court clerk. The prosecuting attorneys were J. J. Lunney and Wm. P. Higgins, while Alfred Bardeley and J. B. Dever, were the "legal lights" for the defence.

OLD TIME BASEBALL FRIEND HEARD FROM
Frank Sexton, Once of the St. John Shamrocks, is to Coach Harvard Team of 1911

A despatch to the Times-Star from Boston, says:— Dr. Frank J. Sexton, of the famous Brown University battery of Sexton and Tenney of the early nineties, was last night announced as next year's baseball coach at Harvard. After pitching on the Brown team, which he captured in '92 and '93, Sexton played with the Boston Nationals one year. In 1895, and 1901-02, he coached the University of Michigan baseball team, turning out champion teams. He coached the Brown team of 1903, and which won the championship. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania medical school in 1898 and has since been practicing in Brookline.

Dr. Sexton will be remembered by old baseball fans here, as having played for a time with the old Shamrocks of this city. In the days when imported batteries were first introduced, he was brought here from Brown University to pitch for the Shamrocks, about the latter part of the season of 1901. One of the notable games in which he played was against Home, an imported pitcher for the St. Johns, and the doctor won his game.

ONE NEW APPLICANT
E. Friars Wants to Open Saloon in Mill Street—Names of County Applicants

Of the list of applicants to deal in the liquor business, received by Inspector J. B. Jones, up to noon today, there was only one new name, that of E. Friars, Mill street, who desires to open a saloon in that street. The number of applications received by the inspector is as follows: Fifty-three retail, eleven wholesale, six hotel, two brewer, and one club. County Inspector E. J. Neve has received seven retail applications for the parish of Lunenburg, and one brewer; and five for the parish of Simonds. Those from the former parish are George Tibbitt, Wm. Terry, Wm. Fleming, Brennan, and Duncanson, J. Sullivan, and M. Dwyer. From Simonds come Mrs. Nellie Barker, E. A. Treadwell, Charles Mayall, Mrs. McCormick, and W. E. Newcomb.

HERE'S SOME TROUBLE FOR MR. HAZEN

John E. Wilson's Friends Insist on Place in Government For Him

CHAFING AT DELAY

He Must Go in at Once, They Say—Premier Worried, for He Steadily Loses Strength Here—Maxwell May Step Out and Take Public Safety Directorship

Will the Hon. Robert Maxwell follow his friends, J. King Kelley and J. B. M. Baxter into comfortable quarters as a municipal officer, free from the turmoil of elections? This question is being asked because there is again a rumor that John E. Wilson must be taken into the government and that it is proposed to make Hon. Mr. Maxwell director of public safety in St. John.

It is well known that Mr. Wilson's friends want him in the government, but Mr. Maxwell would not be expected to climb down without prospects of some sort. It is said that the affair has reached an acute stage, and that something must be done. Mr. Hazen is greatly worried over the situation, for his government has been steadily losing popularity in St. John.

Naturally Mr. Wilson would not desire to wait until the eve of the elections before being taken into the government, and his friends are disposed to resent delay. Hence, they propose to get an office for Mr. Hazen, the proposal to get an office for Mr. John, and thus open the way for Mr. Wilson.

Those who are on the inside assert that unless Mr. Wilson is at once taken into the government he will not again be a candidate.

A NORTHWEST MOUNTED POLICE CONSTABLE HERE

J. D. Clancy in the City from Saskatoon to Take D. K. Turner Back to West

J. D. Clancy, a constable in the Northwest Mounted Police, stationed at Saskatoon, arrived in the city this morning, and is at the Royal. On arriving he went to the central police station to make arrangements for bringing back to the west Duncan K. Turner, who is wanted in Saskatoon on a money charge, and who has been in jail here for about a week, since being arrested as he was about to sail for England.

Constable Clancy will leave this evening in company with the prisoner. At Montreal he will place Turner in jail and make up lost sleep and on leaving there on Friday night will arrive in Saskatoon on Monday morning. Other than knowing that the warrant had been sworn for the arrest of Turner, Constable Clancy said he knew nothing of the charge.

Lieutenant-Governor Among the Pall Bearers—People Present From Out of Town

Chatham, N. B., Dec. 28—(Special)—The funeral of Warren C Winslow took place this morning and was largely attended by many friends. The service took place in the cathedral where high mass of requiem was celebrated at 9 o'clock. The pall bearers were: Lieut. Gov. Tweedie, R. A. Lawlor, K.C., F. E. Neale, Wm. Dick, Howard McKendry, W. S. Loggie, M. P., W. B. Booth and Col. McKenney. The chief mourners were the two sons of the deceased, his brother, E. P. Winslow, the inspector of the bank of Montreal; J. J. Winslow, F. E. Winslow, D. H. Winslow and Bruce Winslow, cousin, of Fredericton; W. W. Park of Newcastle; Col. H. Montgomery Campbell, of Apohaqui and Geo. Carvill of St. John, brother-in-law.

The town council of Chatham also attended, together with a large number of the citizens.

Although it was requested that no flowers be sent there were many very beautiful floral offerings.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY IS CALLED AS WITNESS

Hearing in Suit of J. J. McGaffigan Against Wilet Fruit Co. Begun

Before Chief Justice Barker in the Chancery Court this morning, at 11 o'clock the trial of the case of J. J. McGaffigan vs. The Wilet Fruit Company was commenced. This is a suit to determine the ownership of a wall between the buildings in Dock street, occupied by both parties to the suit. Hon. Wm. Pugsley, who had charge of the building a few years ago, was this morning called by the plaintiff, Mr. Pugsley said that he did not know who owned the wall.

The case will be continued tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. M. G. Teed, K. C., appears for the plaintiff, and A. A. Wilson, K. C., and J. King Kelley for the defendant.

Summons for directions were signed by Mr. Justice McKeen in the chambers of the chancery division this morning. Dr. S. Alward, K. C., W. A. Ewing, K. C., W. B. Booth, F. R. Taylor, E. S. J. Freeze and G. E. Logan were the lawyers interested.
