M. R. A. TEAM WINS CHAMPIONSHIP OF CLERICAL BOWLING LEAGUE

BARBOUR TEAM FINISHED CLOSE SECOND IN RACE

Thomas Jenkins Wins High Average and Three-String Prizes

DEFEAT TROJANS IN FINAL GAME AND WIN TITLE

By defeating the Trojans by a score of 32 to 22 in the final game of their series last evening the Rideaus of Ottawa clinched the basketball championship of Eastern Canada and earned the right to play off with the winners of the Edmonton-Vancouver series for the Dominion title.

The Ottawa boys won the series on their merits, excelling over the locals in fast combination playing and defensive tactics. However, they were forced to extend themselves from the start until the termination of the game, and their victory was hard earned.

In the first period the Trojans were away off and only succeeded in netting one field goal and two baskets on penalty throws. On the other hand, the visitors totalled 16 points by fast and brilliant combination playing.

In the second period the locals took on a new lease of life and fought valiantly to overcome the handicap, but failed. They were cheered to the echo by their followers when they staged a sensational rally towards the close of the game, but just at a time when they seemed to have found themselves and were plugging up points, the wily captain of the Rideaus called for time out, and during the two minutes' rest period collected his team mates and worked out a new line campaign.

It was good strategy and put a crimp in the locals' rally. The fans deeply resented this action, but the referee explained that he was entitled to do so.
