

SENT UP FOR TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

John Paris, Accused of Death of Sadie McAuley, Says "Not Guilty"

John Paris was committed for trial yesterday afternoon in the police court on the charge of murdering little Sadie McAuley after his lawyer, G. H. Vernon, had waived the evidence of other witnesses which the prosecution intended to call later.

James Kimball, aged thirteen years, was the first witness yesterday afternoon. He said that he lived in Prince Edward street and remembered distinctly going to Douglas avenue in August to pick berries.

William Joseph Levine, father of Hattie Levine, remembered Sadie McAuley being with his daughter when she had delivered her lunch to him on the fatal day. He said that they both went picking berries after giving him his lunch.

Ronald McAuley, father of the murdered child, said that the real name of the murdered child was Sarah Jane but that she was always called Sadie. She was nine years of age and had a little hip trouble which caused her to walk slightly different from other children.

Ernest Campbell, 123 Water street, west, said that he could remember August 3 from the fact that early that morning Brittain's fish house had been destroyed by fire. He saw Walter Humphrey and the accused come along that morning.

ARMAMENT NEEDS IN PEACE TIMES

"The need of armaments in peace times" was the subject of an address given by Captain Henry G. H. Adams, C. B. F., R. N., commander of the Canadian Navy, at a Canadian Club luncheon in Bond's yesterday.

Mr. Adams said, to drive home the necessity of a navy in peace times. He referred to the views of Premier Massey of New Zealand and Premier Hughes of Australia favoring a strong navy in the Pacific and to the opinion expressed by Premier Meighen of Canada that if Canadians were to share in the assets of the Empire they should also share in its responsibilities.

At the conclusion of Captain Adams' address, Mr. Porter extended him the thanks of the club. The meeting was brought to a close with three cheers for the Canadian navy and the singing of the National Anthem.

K. OF C. READY TO BE INVESTIGATED

New York, Sept. 23.—The Knights of Columbus are ready for investigation by any lawfully constituted authority, Supreme Secretary William J. McGinley declared in a statement dealing with adoption by the city council of Atlanta, Ga., of resolutions calling on newspapers investigating alleged un-American institutions to include the Knights of Columbus.

"Any man," said Mr. McGinley, "who states that the K. of C. is unpatriotic and un-American must have been emulating Rip Van Winkle during the war. To base a demand for investigation on the bogus oath attributed to the K. of C. indicates the intelligence of the men voting for it."
