

ENJOY YOUR VACATION

AT
REVELSTOKE, B. C.

A vacation to be ideal must be spent where the climate is healthful, the scenery varied, accessible and educational; the hotel accommodation up-to-date, with hunting and fishing grounds close to good roads. All these conditions await the traveler at Revelstoke, located on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which traverses no fewer than four National parks, situate in the Rocky and Selkirk Mountains.



Between Revelstoke and Field the Railway Company provides a special open-top Observation Car on all trains making the daylight run between these points; the traveler may, therefore, secure an unobstructed view of the scenery.

Revelstoke, at an altitude of 1,494 feet has an atmosphere which is neither too relaxing nor too bracing, while the long days of sunshine followed by nights that are always cool, combine to produce health and vigor. The water supply comes from a point high up in the eternal snow and is pure, cold and refreshing.

The Arrow Lakes, some 129 miles in length, are served by the palatial C. P. R. boats, where one can spend a day admiring scenery unequalled in America or Europe. Halcyon Hot Springs Hotel provides accommodation for those wishing to take advantage of the Hot Springs where marvelous cures of rheumatism are being recorded. No tourist can afford to leave Revelstoke without making this trip.



AUTO ROADS

The Okanagan-Revelstoke Highway offers a delightful trip by motor from the U. S. A. via Oroville on the International boundary and the Okanagan Valley to Revelstoke. The journey may be continued to Arrowhead, 28 miles distant, thence over the Arrow Lakes by boat to West Robson (charges \$7.00 to \$9.00), from which point one can motor to Northport on the U.S.A. boundary.

REVELSTOKE NATIONAL PARK

Is a Mountain-top Park situate on a wide park-like plateau with scattered groves of balsam and fir. Everywhere, growing in great profusion, are daisies, lillies, violets, marigolds, lupins, and red mountain heather. Towards the East are four charming lakes—Eva, Heart, Green and Miller. To the alpine climber the nearby glaciers offer all the difficulties and fascinations of the Swiss Alps. Visitors, particularly those with a camping outfit, should make note of this wonderful scenic trip, the only one of its kind in Canada, where one can motor from the City seventeen miles up the slopes of Mount Revelstoke on an excellent road, with an easy grade, never exceeding seven per cent. winding through virgin forest, or along the rocky ledges, to a point 4,600 feet above the City. Other delightful side-trips are Begbie, Big Bend and Greely Roads.



HUNTING AND FISHING

Caribou, Goat, Deer and the Grizzly, Cinnamon and Black bear can be hunted by either road, river or trail.



Trout of all sizes abound in the Arrow, Summit, Victor, Griffin and Three Valley Lakes. In the Columbia River Dolly Varden Trout from three to eighteen pounds are plentiful during September and October, and good catches can be secured in all other streams.

SUMMER AND WINTER SPORTS

Tobogganing, snow-shoeing, skiing, skating and curling may be thoroughly enjoyed in our mild climate. Revelstoke has the finest Ski Hill in America and is considered by experts to surpass the famous Blumendahl Hill in Norway. The annual Ski Tournament attracts the best ski jumpers in the world. A new \$12,000.00 skating and curling rink will be completed this fall, and a golf course has been laid out.

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
