BY PRESIDENT GOMPERS

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Labor had halted the shock troops of its enemies, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, announced in his speech to the International Typographical Union annual convention. Mr. Gompers said that all over the world, just before or soon after the armistice, capital made up its mind that it

Mr. Gompers said that the attempt to get Chinese labor into Hawaii was only a forerunner to attempts to introduce it into the
