DEATH OF H. P. OTTY.

Henry Phillips Otty, an old and esteemed citizen, died last evening at his home on Wright street. Mr. Otty was eighty-one years old, and was the son of the late Capt. Allan Otty, R. N. In 1860 he gave up a large milling business and entered the post office department in this city, where he remained until about seven years ago.

His wife was Miss Henrietta Howe, sister of the late John Howe, formerly post master here. Mr. Otty was a daughter, Mrs. (Judge) Favery, of Annapolis, who died ten years ago. The only surviving relative is a brother, Mr. McG. Otty, civil engineer of Winnipeg.

NEW SEAMEN'S MISSION.

At the monthly meeting of the Seamen's Mission last evening, it was decided to purchase a lot on Prince William street. The lot of management will today settle on a lot. After the first of May the work of the mission will have to be carried on in temporary quarters.

During the month over 1,500 men visited the mission rooms, 600 letters were written by sailors to relatives, 3,000 books and papers were placed on outward bound vessels, over 300 hand charts were given to fishermen and skippers, and 1,200 ferry tickets were used.

TORONTO, April 12.—A telegram was received here today announcing the accidental death, last night, of Thomas Dowdie, trainmaster of the C. P. R. at Revelstoke as a result of a snow slide in the Selkirk mountains.

Mr. Dowdie formerly lived in Toronto, being connected with the Northern Railway here. His remains are being brought to this city for burial by his brother, William Dowdie, of St. John, N. B., general superintendent of the Atlantic division of the C. P. R.

TUG FLUSHING DAMAGED.

The tug Flushing sustained somewhat serious damage at Sand Point yesterday morning while giving assistance in the handling of the str. Montezuma. She was located at the time of the occurrence close in to much of the ship, and the Montezuma's propeller struck the hull of the tug amidships and damaged it to such an extent that the Flushing had to hurry down to the Lower Cove slip to prevent sinking. She was rapidly filling with water. It is expected the Flushing will be fixed up and ready for business today.

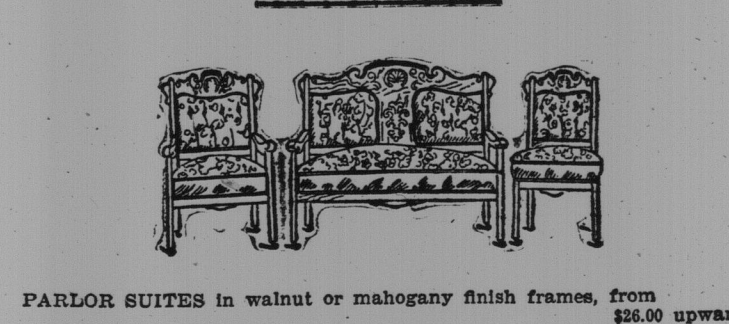
