BOSTON'S FAMOUS DISTRICT
A TUNNEL HAS PASSED AWAY

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 6.—John B. Moran, district attorney of Boston, died in the St. Luke's home tonight of tuberculosis of the throat.
Mr. Moran came here about two weeks ago, after spending some time in the Adirondacks and at Denver. He seemingly was improving until three days ago, when he was taken suddenly worse and sank rapidly. He was cheerful to the end, joking and telling funny stories until overcome by weakness.
BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 7.—John B. Moran, district attorney of Suffolk County, who was stricken down with tuberculosis early last year, forcing him to seek health in the Adirondacks and the west, died last night in Phoenix, Ariz., where he had been for two weeks past, according to word received here early today.
Attorney Moran showed indomitable courage throughout his illness and remained cheerful until the end.
The district attorney was true to his sobriquet of "the man who dares" when his physicians rendered the verdict, ten months ago, that he was suffering from tuberculosis and must go to another climate. On his departure he said he would return to Massachusetts and be governor yet.
By indomitable will and brilliancy as a criminal trial lawyer and cross-examination lawyer as well as public defender, John B. Moran forced himself prominently into the public eye, and born in Wakefield, sixty years ago, he went through the schools of his native town, Phillips-Andover Academy and Boston University, entering the bar and practicing in Woburn and Boston.
In 1905 he defeated District Attorney Michael J. Sugrue, although the latter had Republican and Democratic support, and was elected as an independent candidate in 1907 for a second three-year term.
In 1906 he ran for governor on four tickets, as Democrat, Prohibitionist, Independence League and as a citizen of Boston, losing to Governor Gould by a narrow margin.

TWO LARGE CAR
BURNS BURNED

MELROSE, Mass., Feb. 6.—One of the two large car barns burned by the Chelsea Division of the Boston and Northern Railway Company, situated on Green street, Melrose Highlands, was burned tonight, with six large electric cars and valuable machinery used in repair work, causing a loss of \$75,000.
The flames spread to the second car barn, separated only by a fifteen foot alley, and also caught on the steps of the Melrose Highlands Free Baptist church and a dwelling occupied by the superintendent of the cars, but in each instance the fire was extinguished without causing much damage.
Captain Thomas Hawke and four men, engaged in keeping the flames from the second car barn, had a narrow escape from death while working in the narrow alleyway separating the barns, by the falling outward of the back wall of the burned building.

MANY CAPE BRETON MINERS LAID OFF

Depression Caused by American Competition and Labour Troubles

HALIFAX, Feb. 8.—Conditions at collieries at Cape Breton have undergone some little change in the past week. During the past few days a large number of men have been laid off by the Dominion Coal Co. in several of their collieries. Since Friday about 150 men have been laid off at Dominion No. 3 colliery and 100 at Caladonia colliery. The reason given for laying off so many men is that the company have no sale at present for their small coal. Practically all the men laid off are pillar men and cutters.
Dominion No. 6 colliery, which has been idle for nearly two months will start work tomorrow.
A committee of the P. W. A. at No. 6 accompanied by Grand Master S. P. McNeill and Grand Secretary Moffat had an interview with General Manager Duggan, Saturday, which proved very satisfactory and resulted in promising more work at that colliery. It is learned that Mr. Duggan pointed out to the men the difficulty of securing a market for the coal mined by the company owing to American competition which is greater than ever this year and increasing in the territory formerly controlled by the Coal Company. They were also handicapped by the knowledge that labor difficulties existed owing to the U. M. A. P. W. A. action that might cause trouble and prevent them fulfilling their contracts. This all mitigated against furnishing steady work and made it necessary for the company to keep the output from the collieries within an amount that they could reasonably depend upon selling.

LOOK FOR MORE ANTI-JAPANESE LEGISLATION

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 8.—Indications are that more anti-Japanese bills will appear in the Oregon legislature. The Bailey resolution was memorialized to Congress.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 7.—A special dispatch received tonight from San Francisco says that President Roosevelt is retransmitting the following to Governor J. N. Gillette at Sacramento, Cal.
"I saw Pilot as soon as your message came. He has been helping me in every possible way and after consulting with him I wired Speaker Stanton a message which he can make public if he thinks advisable. Please see him. I am unqualified at Perkins' conduct. He has for the last several years done what he could to hamper us in the rebuilding of the navy and has acted against the real advocates of the navy. Yet now he advises a policy of whittling insult."
"I have nothing to advise at the present moment but I cannot break too highly in praise of the course you have followed. I suppose my telegram to the speaker is the best way I can render assistance. Please wire me if there is anything I can do."
