Maxwell, Wilson, Hatheway and McInerney at the last elections. There is a general disposition to vote the straight government ticket and workers do not look for much variation in the vote polled by the winning candidates.

## NO TRACE YET OF YOUNG WILLIAMSON

Young Man who Disappeared from His Home, Williamson's Wharf, on Sunday Afternoon Still Missing.

The disappearance of Leonard Williamson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Williamson, of Williamson's wharf has thrown a gloom over that community. At a late hour last night the mystery had not been cleared up, but hopes that he is alive were still entertained by his people.

The last seen of the young man was about 6:45 Sunday afternoon, when he started for his boat to row across the river. The boat was discovered adrift next morning, one oar was in the boat but the other was missing. He was not seen to enter the boat. The missing youth was about 18 years of age, was 5 feet, 6 inches in height, and weighed 145 pounds. He was of light complexion, with light brown hair, which he left home, he wore a cap with light green stripes, a blue and green tie, blue shirt, a gray suit with green socks and tan button boots. He carried a gold Waltham watch and a gold chain.

## NOT ALWAYS EASY TO FIND SAILORS

Re-measuring Regulations Suspended Pending Enquiry—British Board of Trade Admits Shortage of Seamen.

As intimated by The Standard a few days ago instructions have not been issued to the collector of customs suspending all action with regard to the re-measuring regulations until such time as a thorough investigation into existing conditions can be made. Some little time ago a circular was addressed to owners and masters of vessels from the collector of customs informing them that it would be necessary to comply immediately with the law passed in 1904 under which all vessels were to be re-measured at their register ports and to be manned by passed masters and in the case of power craft, by certified engineers. This caused something like consternation among local shipping for it was realized that ninety per cent. of the tonnage would be put out of business inasmuch as officers so qualified could not be obtained.

The annual report of the British Board of Trade for 1911 called attention to the rapidly decreasing supply of qualified seamen and it is felt here that if such difficulty is being experienced in Britain as is outlined in that report, local vessels would have a slim chance of meeting the requirements of the law. This is the second time this law has been suspended for practically the same reasons as have now led the minister of marine to interfere.
