HEAVY LIQUIDATION WITH FOREIGN OFFERINGS AN IMPORTANT FACTOR

Professionals help hammer down prices—Foreign news unsettles market, unconfirmed reports of probable cancelling of War Orders, causing a depression.

New York, Nov. 9.—The heavy liquidation which swept over yesterday's late market was renewed with greater vigor today, all parts of the list scoring new minimums for the current movement. The decline gathered increased force from professional sources, traders in general being active on the short side of the account. Foreign offerings were also an important factor, estimates of London's sales ranging from 25,000 to 50,000 shares. In fact, much of the day's unsettlement was caused by further pessimistic advices from abroad. These bore largely upon political and financial conditions affecting the allied nations, and were supplemented by unconfirmed rumors that large war orders were in danger of cancellation. Apart from steady pressure, however, the market manifested many symptoms of an artificial character, which made it vulnerable to attack. Final prices were only a trifle above low levels for high grade securities, while specialties made only nominal recoveries. All the activity of the session was at the expense of values, trading becoming dull on every covering movement. Total sales amounted to 1,135,000 shares. Some of the extreme declines were:

Studebaker, 23 at 140; Willys-Overland, 26 at 210; General Motors, 20 at 370; Baldwin Locomotive, 4 at 113; Tennessee Copper, 5 at 51, and Great Northern Ore, 3 at 46½.
Shares in the so-called "near" war class, like American Linsseed, common and preferred, United States Industrial Alcohol, Distillers Securities and American Coal Products, lost three to ten points. United States Steel, which was among the few leaders to show actual strength at the opening, declined to 83½ and closed at 84 3/8, a net gain of 4.

In the railways declines ran from one to two points. St. Paul, Norfolk and western and the southern lines showing least resistance. Trading in these issues was broader than usual. Metal shares yielded much of their recent advance, although technical conditions in that industry continued altogether favorable.

Among the railway returns of the day was that of the Missouri Pacific system, showing a net decrease of \$23,000 for September.
Bonds sagged in sympathy, some speculative issues making appreciable declines. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$4,745,500.

CLOSING LETTER OF N. Y. MARKET BY E. & C. RANDOLPH

(McDOUGALL & COWANS.)

New York, Nov. 9.—The heavy liquidation in the stock market continued practically without interruption to the end of the day, and the closing prices were not far from the lowest. Rallies were few and small, and advantage was taken of them to make sales by those who were liquidating their holdings. There was no sign at the end that the decline had reached its termination, but the technical position has been somewhat improved and prices are considerably lower than they were before the downward movement set in. The support rendered to U. S. Steel encouraged the belief that the tonnage statement to be published tomorrow would be better than expected, but if that does not prove to be the case, there may be selling by disappointed speculators. It is, of course, true that the activity in the trade is very great, and that new business is exceeding the capacity of the plants, but it is hardly possible that the estimates of an increase of 500,000 tons for the month in the unfilled orders can be greatly exceeded. On all further reactions the railroad issues should be bought. The foreign exchange market was steady. Sales 1,078,144. Bonds \$4,658,000.
