SENT TO PRISON
FOR SEVENTH TIME

Presented woman with
Furs valued at \$697 and
have worthless cheque.

Toronto, Dec. 14.—E. MacDonald's
blundering career received its eighth
temporary halt this morning when he
was sentenced to three years in King-
ston penitentiary for passing a worth-
less cheque. With two women he was
to Sellers-Gough's store and picked out
\$57.75 worth of furs. He told the man-
ager he had been left \$150,000 by his
father and that he owned 40,000 bush-
els of wheat in the west.

He was arrested just as he was pre-
paring to leave the city with the two
women. He was found to have served
seven different sentences on Manitoba
penitentiary for similar offences, his
time totalling 19 years, the longest be-
ing a seven year term. He had been
out only a few months. The women
were discharged.

MEETING IN YARMOUTH
IN THE INTERESTS OF
NO. 7 STATIONARY HOSPITAL

Yarmouth, Dec. 14.—A very large
and enthusiastic audience was present
this evening at Zion church when Mr.
Justice Ritchie of Halifax and Pro-
fessor Spidle of Acadia University, de-
livered eloquent addresses on behalf
of No. 7 Stationary Hospital. Mayor
Fuller occupied the chair.

Mr. Justice Ritchie's address was
eloquent and his appeal for cause of
the number seven stationary hospital
was most earnest and interesting, hold-
ing the closest attention of the audi-
ence throughout. His reference to
Lieut. Col. Dr. John Stewart and what
his name meant in connection with
this great work was most enthusias-
tically received. He also briefly re-
ferred to the patriotic and recruiting side
of the matter, strongly urged that noth-
ing should be allowed to interfere in
bringing this great war to a grand
and successful conclusion on the part
of the Allies.

Professor Spidle's address was
more on patriotic matters and stronger
appeals for patriotism was never be-
fore delivered in this town. At the
close the speakers were most enthus-
iastically applauded and by the address
of Mr. Justice Ritchie the people of
Yarmouth have for the first time real-
ly had the work of the stationary placed
before them. The appeals were most
strongly put and when this town is
called upon for her "little bit" she will
not be found in the back-ground but
well to front and ready at any mo-
ment.

SHOCKING NEWS FOR
OFFICER'S WIFE ON
REACHING ENGLAND

Learns for first time that
husband is charged with
murder—Authorities still
puzzled over case.

London, Dec. 14.—(Gazette Cable)—
Mrs. Coderre, of Sherbrooke, Que., the
wife of Lieut. Coderre, who is under
arrest in connection with the murder
of Sergt. Ozanne, of the 9th Mounted
Rifles, arrived in London today and
heard for the first time of her hus-
band's arrest. The news was a severe
shock to the young wife of the officer,
who had planned to meet her on her
arrival in England. She left at once
for Whitehall to see her husband.

The firm of Hon. Charles Russell,
legal advisers for the Quebec govern-
ment in London, have been instructed
by Mr. Pelletier, agent general of the
province of Quebec, to undertake the
defence of Lieut. Coderre, and a mem-
ber of the firm has gone to Whitehall
to see the Lieutenant and make an in-
vestigation of the case.

The killing of Sergt. Ozanne was
done in a most brutal manner, the
body being slashed by a knife in such
a way as to indicate that the slayer
was in a mad state of frenzy. The
deed must have been committed by a
powerful man, and doubt is expressed
if a man of Lieut. Coderre's stature
could unaided, have mastered the
sergeant in a struggle. The Lieuten-
ant is a short, wiry man, but not of
great strength. He told the police
after his arrest that they had tested
suspicion on the wrong man, but he
did not volunteer any information
which would aid the police in solving
the mystery.

O. C. Not Notified Until Next Morning.

An astonishing fact of the case is
the fact that Lieut. Col. Archambault
and Major Hughes, of the 41st Batta-
lion, arrived at the officers' mess Wed-
nesday night, after the murder was
committed, and slept all night in the
house without being aware that any-
thing was wrong. It appears that after
the crime was discovered, in a stable
close to the house occupied by the
officers, one of the orderlies started
out to find Col. Archambault and re-
port the tragedy, but passed him in
the darkness.

The orderly did not return until next
morning, and not until then was the
commanding officer of the 41st notified
of the murder. Then the police were
notified. After a hurried investiga-
tion they took Lieut. Coderre into cus-
tody, pending the inquest, and also
took with them two orderlies of the
41st, Duchesne and Keller, who are
detained as witnesses.

Ozanne was divisional canteen ser-
geant, and it is said at the camp that
he was in possession of a consider-
able sum of Canadian money, which he
gave to Lieut. Coderre to be exchang-
ed into sterling while the latter was in
London on Tuesday, the day before
the crime, and it was evidently for
the purpose of settling the transac-
tion that the sergeant came to the
officer's house at Grayshot village on
Wednesday afternoon.

Wednesday evening Lieut. Coderre
meeted as usual with his brother offi-
cers and he betrayed no sign of agita-
tion. His demeanor was not that of a
man who had been involved in a strug-
gle, his brother officers said. Lieut.
Coderre's father resides in Sherbrooke.
Lieut. Coderre came to England with
the first Canadian contingent, but was
returned to Canada with the surplus
officers. Then he returned with the
41st. The 41st Battalion are now in
camp at Aldershot twenty miles from
the scene of the tragedy.

The funeral of Sergt. Ozanne took
place today at Guilford, Surrey with
military honors, the firing party be-
ing supplied by the 9th Mounted Rifles.
Floral wreaths were sent by the offi-
cers, non-coms and men of the 9th.
