CREW ABANDONS SCHOONER.
St. Pierre, Magdalen Islands, Sept. 27—Five members of the crew of the schooner Adra, bound from Gaspe, Quebec, to St. Pierre, with a cargo of lumber and shingles, arrived here today and reported that they had abandoned their vessel 10 miles off Cape La Hune, Nfld., early yesterday morning.

The schooner sprung a leak and began to fill so fast that the men were forced to take to the boats. The captain declared that the ship was not insured.

THE ISAHIA K. STETSON.
Capt. Hamilton of the schooner Isahia K. Stetson, from St. John for New York, before reported in collision Tuesday night in Long Island Sound, with the steamer Lexington, says the vessels sighted each other about the same time, which was shortly after midnight. Both veered off, but the Lexington struck and put a large hole in the schooner's side. Her lumber cargo kept her afloat and a tug which responded to the Lexington's whistling took the Stetson in tow to Newport. The steamer apparently was undamaged.

AGAIN IN COLLISION.
The steamer Storstad, which rammed the Empress of Ireland two years ago, was again in a collision which will cost the owners of the other craft something like \$20,000 to repair, while while the Storstad escaped with only minor injuries. The accident occurred at North Sydney, while the Storstad in ballast was coming down from the coal pier of the Dominion Coal Company, and another Norwegian steamer, the Hatters, was on her way to a berth at the pier. The impact ripped a number of plates off the latter steamer and badly damaged her bow.

SCHOONER PURCHASED.
St. John's, Nfld., Mail, says another new purchase and quite an addition to our mercantile marine has been made by the Smith Co., Ltd. They have acquired the fine schooner A. V. Conard of Lunenburg, a vessel of 147 tons register. She will be used as a fish carrier.
