North of Kemmel, where the Germans on Tuesday gained a footing on Hill 44, one of the bloodiest sectors on the western front, the lost vantage points have been retrieved through the persistent counter-atacks of the French who succeeded in expelling the enemy from the shell holes along the slopes to which he had been tenaclously holding. Not alone were the Germans forced to recede, but the French advanced their line and also took prisoners.
