

August opened with the commercial overcast by storm clouds that threatened serious injury to the steel industry, while drouth in the southwest aroused pessimistic predictions that business was on the verge of a severe set back. Thousands of idle strikers together with a profitless ecason in agricultural regions meant inactivity in manufacturing, trade and transporta-tion, according to the prophets of evil. Instead of the calamitous conditions, how-ever, the month ends with a horizon that is almost clear, and each day resumption of work at an idle mill adds to the pro-ductive capacity, while cancelled orders for merchandise from dealers in the drouth section are rapidly reinstateds Jobbers and manufacturers report that August opened with the commercial
