

PLANS FOR MODERN CITY AND COUNTY BUILDING NOW BEING CONSIDERED

Court House May Be Remodelled at Cost of \$100,000 and Two Stories Added—Would Mean Big Saving in Expense of Departments, and City Hall Would Be Sold—Architect at Work.

Thursday, Feb. 6. There is now every possibility that within two years the city and county will have new quarters for officials and office staffs under one roof. The plans under discussion by the city commissioners are for the remodeling of the court house and other buildings connected with it, and the disposal of the present city hall.

It was suggested at that meeting that the court house be improved to answer the purpose of a municipal building. Since that time Commissioner Agar and McLaughlin have gone more fully into the matter.

Commissioner Agar said yesterday that it was not proposed to do away with the court rooms, but to leave the lower floors practically as they are at present.

It is understood that an architect has been secured and that plans for the proposed change in the court house will be drawn as soon as possible.

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That the population of St. John has steadily increased during the last nine years is shown by the report of the assessors as printed with the city accounts.

When Mayor Frink was asked for figures warranting this statement he referred to the report of the assessors as printed in the last city year book.

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BOSTON'S RUNNING EXPENSES LAST YEAR ABOUT \$40,000,000

Boston, Feb. 6.—It took \$80,000,000 to run the city of Boston last year, an average of \$38.35 for each resident, according to the annual report of the city auditor, made public tonight. The report shows that the city's total expenditure increased \$5,000,000 over the preceding year.
