Several Matters To Be Cleared Up

In Michigan Ontario League President Joe S. Jackson of the Michigan-Ontario Baseball League has not definitely called a meeting of the directors of the new organization for the adoption of a constitution and schedule as he has several matters still to clear up before doing so. He however anticipates that a meeting can be arranged for shortly.

Adoption of schedule completion of club organizations and signing of managers and players have been the features of the new Ontario-Michigan League and everything is working out smoothly on plans for the revival of baseball in a territory that is bound to have a big comeback for it has the adoption of a constitution and been without the real article almost

since the war started in 1914. London has formally chosen Joe Keenan as its manager. H. Pierce will lead the team in Flint, Knot's Lee is at Brantford. The veteran Jack Beatty will lead the Kitchener team. Hamilton is reported decided upon Frank Shaughnessy. Saginaw has practically decided upon Westall of Columbus while Danny Jenkins, the well-known minor league leader is at the head of the Battle Creek club. Bay City has yet to decide upon its managerial selection. The season will open on May 15 and the players will report for training in mid-April.

The O.H.A. Executive held a meeting at the King Edward at 2 o'clock this afternoon to hear the Woodstock version of the outrage perpetrated on the Industrial City soccer team previous to the U.T.S. Woodstock fixture at the Arena last Saturday night. Woodstock are not convinced that the best team won the O.H.A. junior title and are desirous of meeting the Blue Shirts in another game. However it is hardly likely that their request will be granted. There was some talk of substituting Woodstock for Regina Patricia in to-morrow night's fixture at the Arena, but no definite arrangements have been made and it is not thought probably that U.T.S. will meet Woodstock again. They would have everything to lose and nothing to gain by so doing.

Racing will again be a feature of the Canadian National Exhibition this year. At a meeting yesterday afternoon it was decided in view of the numerous requests from stock-raisers interested in light horses to hold speed trails on four days.

The first event will be held on the Saturday afternoon preceding the formal opening and the remaining three on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday following the opening.

Allan Cup Will Stay In The East

SELKIRK WIN LAST GAME 5 TO 1
But Lose Round to Hamilton

TORONTO Mar 21—"Showing a reversal of form that was positively startling Selkirk tonight in a game that went into overtime swept the Hamilton Tigers off their feet and beat them 5 to 1, but lost the round by one goal. The Toronto fans almost to a man cheered the Westerners on, and when Hughes ran in three goals in the dying moments of the game and put his team on even terms with the O.H.A. champions, they swarmed out on the ice and hugged and embraced each other in wild glee.

The game was a thriller and it is safe to say that no more exciting battle was ever staged here. Selkirk adopted the tactics used by local teams and got results. On Tuesday night the forwards went into the corners and were caught "flat-footed" on many occasions. Another noticeable fault they showed was a tendency to shoot from long range. Last night things were different "Joe" Simpson and Hughes the little forward, learned a whole lot in the first contest and imparted their knowledge to the other and less experienced members of the team. Both were quick to detect that the system used on the smaller ice surfaces in the West would never do here and immediately set about to accustom themselves to the Eastern style and the results were gratifying. All three forwards checked back with determination and when they shot from outside the defence went in for the rebounds.

Gillespie Scores First.
Selkirk were easily the better in the first half, but were unfortunate in their shooting and notched but one goal. Their good showing led their supporters to believe that they would win the game but very few conceded them a chance to tie the count on the round. In the second period they battled every inch of the way until the Tigers were absolutely dismayed. They only secured one goal in the first twenty-four minutes of the final half, but in the remaining six minutes Jack Hughes scored three times and placed his team on even terms with the Tigers on the round. In the first minute of the overtime period Matte broke away, slipped by Bradow and notched the winning counter from close in.

Cannot Reject League Covenant

AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY NEUTRALS BEING CONSIDERED

PARIS, March 22. (By Fred S. Ferguson).—The league of nations committee, President Wilson presiding, met to-day to consider the amendments to the covenant proposed by neutrals during the last two days.

While the constitution was thus being reshaped, the United Press was informed authoritatively that the American senate will have to accept or reject the entire preliminary peace treaty, including the league covenant.

Separation of the treaty and the covenant as cabled from the United States indicate that the Republican leaders are planning to do, would be impossible under the program now

French Soldiers Said to Have Mutined

TWO REGIMENTS BALKED AT ODESSA

PARIS, March 22.—Reports reached both Socialists and Russian representatives here to-day that two French regiments in the Odessa region mutinied when they were ordered to attack the Bolsheviks.

The French troops were said to have sent a delegation to their officers declaring they were ready to fight for France, but not to fight our brothers.

Reminded that this was mutiny and that the penalty was death, the soldiers were reported to have said they recognized this, but that the decision could not be altered. No executions were reported.

Senator Borah Speaks of League Covenant

IS A TROUBLE MAKER
WASHINGTON, March 22. (By L. Martin).—With a staggering war expense bill still unpaid, the American people are earnestly inquiring how much membership in the league of nations will cost them before they take on the contract, so Senator Borah of Idaho declared to-day on his return from his speaking tour against the league.

Borah spoke in New York state, Ohio and Indiana. Everywhere he said he found interest increasing in the league covenant.

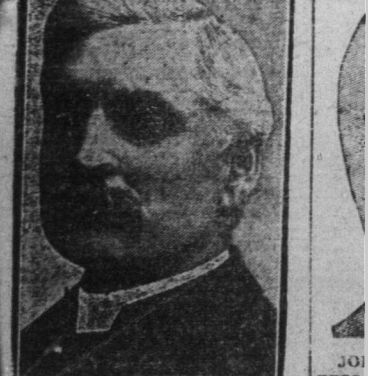
The two questions the people want plain answer to, in Borah's opinion, are: Will the proposed league prevent war or foment it? What will it cost us in men and money?

There is a general feeling he declared, that the league covenant should be separated from the peace treaty.

"The people want the league to stand on its own feet, if there is going to be a league," said Borah. "When they learn what it will cost, they won't want it."

Cables from abroad, telling how Turkey and Armenia demand that the United States be given supervision of their interests, have caused much uneasiness, he said.

The people want no more bills for keeping up a large military establishment to police some other country. They are deeply concerned over meeting their present war bills. They want no more Americans killed fighting a foreign foe on foreign soil.
