A. Well, about \$40. I guess.

Q. Are there any other buildings there? A. Stables.

Q. Worth how much? A. About \$100 I suppose.

Q. Is there any fence about it? A. Oh yes.

Q. Fence would be worth how much?

A. I dont know, about \$10. I guess.

Q. For the widow Fiddler, what improvements has she?

A. She has got about two acres under cultivation.

Q. Is this fenced? A. Yes. They just make one fence to the breadth of these three families.

Q. One inclosure? A. Yes, one enclosure.

Q. What is the total value of the fence on the three places?

A. About \$40. I suppose, \$30 or \$40.
