

The Growing Feeling in China

Against Russia Pekin, Nov. 6 .- The Chinese continue to be disturbed at Russia's action in

re-occupying Mukden, and the Chinese

Foreign Office, through its delegate, Lessar. The latter replied that he is astonished that China should wonder at Russia's action in view of the per-sistent refusal of China to accede to the Russian demands, previously announced. To those demands are now added another, that a Russian resident shall be appointed at Mukden and shall

shall be appointed at Mukden and shall be attached to the staff of the Tartar General to advise him in all affairs. China, which had shown some disposition lately to listen more favorably to the Russian demands, being willing to pay a large price to "save her face" and avert disaster by the loss of Manchuria, is also somewhat alarmed at the reports of Tokio negotiations to the effect that Japan has represented that she is prepared to recognize the rights acquired by Russia in Manchuria. Japan, however, has assured China that she would never consent to make any com-

acquired by Russia in Manchuria. Japan, however, has assured China that she would never consent to make any compromise with Russia involving the recognition of any impairment of Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria, but at the same time Japan warns China that if she agrees to the Russian demands Japan would be compelled to reconsider her attitude.

Shanghai, Nov. 5.—Local officials and the press are following with keen interest the course of events in Pekin. It is generally recognized that the situation is critical, and that the Government must decide whether the advice of the patriotic Chinese Viceroys shall prevail and China make an effort to preserve her sovereign rights in Manchuria, or whether Prince Ching and other corrupt advisers of the throne shall be permitted to hand the country over to Russian dominiou. The appointment of Nantung to the Presidency of the Board of Foreign affairs is in some quarters regarded as an indication that the Government has decided to accept the support of Japan, but the fact that the Foreign Office is now exclusively composed of notoriously venal Manchus is also considered significant. Prince Ching's plea of sickness at the time of the crisis is largely due to his own corrupt incapacity and causes no surprise.

MONEY FOR THE NAVY.

Contributions from Canada Will be Forthcoming.

London, Nov. 6 .- The writer of etter in The Globe signed "Canad referring to contributions to the navy,

referring to contributions to the navy, says he does not hesitate to say that the money will be forthcoming from the people of Canada in spite of the Canadian press or Canadian politicians, who are not the real mouthpiece of Canadian opinion. The Globe says "Canadian" is a well-known representative of the Dominion.

Several large apple shippers are writing to Mr. W. L. Griffiths, Lord Strathcona's secretary, warning Canadian fruit men to slacken the export of apples by the 14th of December, as after that date the trade will be slack until early in January. Women agents, acting on behalf of the mill owners in Valleyfield and other manufacturing localities in Canada, have been scouring Lancashire and Yorkshire in search of women weavers willing to emigrate to the Dominion.
