

to attend to your private concerns. I cannot however dismiss you without expressing my satisfaction at the regard you have paid to those objects which I recommended to your consideration.

*Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

The temper and liberality you have shewn in renewing the Act to appoint Commissioners for the purpose of treating with the Commissioners of *Upper Canada*, are such as become a deliberative Assembly, and will I doubt not, tend to confirm that harmony and good understanding which subsists between the Sister Provinces.

*Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

*and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

From the dutiful and loyal demeanour manifested by His Majesty's subjects of all descriptions in the Province, there will be little occasion I am persuaded, for resorting to the extraordinary powers vested for a time in the Executive Government, for its preservation; and should any alien emissaries persist in their attempts to disturb our tranquility, I trust they will find that your vigilance and zeal for the Constitution are in no respect abated.

When the subject is conscious that he enjoys in full security his personal liberty and private property; the possession of these benefits, and the desire of preserving them, must excite the attachment of every reflecting mind for those institutions under which they are derived. By calling the attention of your neighbours and constituents in your several Counties to these objects, you cannot fail to confirm their affection and gratitude to the government that protects them in the enjoyment of such advantages.
