4, Cap. 114, to the payment of the Custom-House Establishment, under the authority of the Lords of the Treasury;—But His Excellency regrets that he has not yet received an answer to the same.

Satisfied, however, that His Majesty's Government have at all times a desire to pay a due and prompt attention to the representations of the House of Assembly, His Excellency is disposed to attribute the delay that has occurred, in the present instance, to the late frequent changes in the Colonial Department; and also, probably, to the difficulty experienced in adopting some general arrangement for the support of the Custom-House Establishments in all His Majesty Colonial Possessions.

But, anxious to do all in his power to promote a speedy and satisfactory settlement of a question, to which he is aware the House of Assembly attach much importance, His Excellency did some time ago, address a Letter to Mr. Huskisson, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for ite Colonies, calling that Right Honourable Gentleman's attention to His Excellency's Dispatch to Earl Bathurst, and the Address of the House of Assembly, which accompanied it; and His Excellency entertains a sanguine hope, that he will be enabled to make a satisfactory communication to the House, in answer thereto, from His Majesty's Government, in the course of the Session.

His Excellency further informs the House of Assembly, that he transmitted, in like Address of the manner to His Majesty's Government, the Address, presented to him in the last Session, praying that His Majesty would be graciously pleased to dispense with the Declaration against Popery and Transubstantiation, and His Excellency attributes to the same cause, the circumstance of his not having received an answer to his Dispatch upon this subject.
