### LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

The railways reported 117 carloads of live stock at the city market consisting of 1781 cattle, 1387 hogs, 1108 sheep and lambs and 482 calves.

The quality of fat cattle was generally medium to good, with a few choice lots amongst them.

Trade was active for the best cattle, but at times inclined to be slow for the medium and common, as the drovers were asking higher prices than the dealers were prepared to give.

Prices for cattle were as strong as on Monday for the same quality.

Butchers.—George Rowntree, who bought 780 fat cattle for the Harris Abattoir Company, reported prices as follows:—Butchers' steers and heifers, \$5.30 to \$6.10; cows \$3 to \$5.10; canners, \$1.75 to \$2.50; bulls \$3.50 to \$5.25.

Milkers and Springers.—Milkers and Springers were slow at \$30 to \$60 each.

Veal Calves.—Wesley Dunn, who bought over 200, reported an average of \$7.50 per cwt., or a range in prices of from \$4 to \$8 per cwt.

Sheep and lambs.—Heavy ewes, \$3 to \$3.50; light ewes, \$4 to \$5; bucks, \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.; lambs, \$6 to \$8 per cwt.

Hogs.—Selects, fed and watered at the market, were quoted at \$7.75, and \$7.40 to drovers f.o.b. cars at country points.

L. A. Scott, of Oroville, had a wonderful escape from death a few days ago. While he was driving a herd of cattle over the mountains from Oroville, the horse he was riding suddenly sank to its shoulders in the soft snow. Scott jumped to one side, only to see the animal completely disappear from view an instant later. An investigation showed that it had disappeared down an old mining shaft, at least 50 feet in depth. The horse was killed.

### Hicks' Weather Forecasts For August.

A regular Storm Period, in progress at the close of July, will bring Mercurial cloudiness and summer storms to eastern parts of the country, during the first two or three days of August.

A reactionary storm period has its center on the 5th and 6th. On and touching these dates, look for marked increase of temperature, falling barometer, and moderate to light, misty rains. We do not believe that rains will be sufficient for crops that are not matured by early August, except in narrow localities and along the middle eastern sections.

A regular Storm Period extends from the 6th to the 14th, having full Moon on the 9th, and Moon on the equator on the 13th. This period will bring threatening clouds, fall of the barometer and violent, blustering winds. Relief from great warmth will follow disturbances at this time, and many sections will get light to moderate rains, but not sufficient for general agricultural needs.

The 9th is the centre of a marked seismic period, extending about four days before and after that date. On and about the 13th, a crisis of electrical and seismic disturbance. Note this forecast. The quadrature of Saturn falls on the 13th, and the quadrature of Mars on the 8th, facts greatly tending to seismic trouble.

A reactionary Storm Period is central on the 17th and 18th, calling for renewed summer heat, falling barometer and blustering storms. A show of rain, amounting to showers in scattered sections, will result at this and other August storm periods. Make the most of them for you will surely need them.

A Regular Storm Period covers the 20th to 25th, central on the 22nd. Earth's autumnal equinox will bear on this period, Moon being in perigee and at new. Tidal dangers and equinoctial storms are indicated for the gulf regions at this time. A seismic wave is also coincident with this period, central on the 23rd. Some of the most destructive storms on the gulf and along the southern coasts occur in the month of August. This fact should never be lost sight of by those who are exposed to the possible fury of equatorial and West India storms. When such disturbances appear in the south in August, prematurely cool weather and frosts are apt to occur over much of the interior parts of the country northward. Such things are probable this month, during and following the storm period 20th to the 26th.

A reactionary storm period will bring decided storm conditions on the 27th, 28th and 29th. The Moon being on the celestial equator on the 26th, may bring thunder storms and fill the time between this and the preceding period with threatening, stormy weather. Indications are that the month will go out with change to fair and much cooler weather.

### Items of Interest

According to the Pantagraph, published at Bloomington, Ill., there were over 100 guests present at the annual graduation exercises at the Kelso Sanitarium. Dr. Kelso is a former Bruce boy, who is making success in the great American republic. In connection with the graduation a notable address was made by Dr. Vandervort a splendid report, of which is given in the Pantagraph but owing to pressure on space, we extract only a couple of paragraphs as follows: "The training which nurses derive is beneficial in an earning capacity and it also fits them better for their position in life—they make better wives, better mothers and better citizens on account of their technical training. The field is large and the openings are many. For every death there is an average severe illness lasting two years, or for each death per year there are two persons sick throughout the year. This means that since in the United States there are about 1,500,000 deaths annually, there will be about 3,000,000 on the sick list, or an average of 13 days sickness for each person per annum. The minor ailments can be prevented by personal hygiene, public hygiene and the elimination of worry. Undue fatigue leads to greater ailments and greater ailments lead to death."

The special prize of \$500 each given by the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, go to the cattle classes that last year had the largest number of entries in the beef and dairy breeds respectively.

The prize will go to the best animal exhibited in Shorthorns or Holsteins without regard to sex, and the value of it ensures a wide range of competition. It should prove a great incentive to cattlemen to put their best stock in great condition for showing.
