THE sole head of a family, of any make over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Ap plicant must appear in person at the Do minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.
