Annual Meeting of Alexandra Presbyterian

Financial Statement Handed In Was Very Satisfactory.

The annual meeting of Alexandra Presbyterian church was held last night. Reports of the work of the different organizations were read and discussed. The financial statement of the year showed a balance of \$169. There had been raised on the debt fund during the year \$1,452.08, and for all mission purposes, \$1,100. The amount raised for all purposes was \$7,030.84. This was \$28.30 per family, and \$12.78 per member.

It was pointed out that 45 men had gone from the homes of the church as soldiers, also one nurse, Miss Mildred Robertson. One of our men, Company Sergeant Major Thos. Mack, had been killed in action. An honor roll containing all the names will be placed in the church soon.

J. J. McCaffery Stabbed by Drunken Man.

Toronto, Feb. 1.—James J. McCaffery, president of the Toronto Baseball Club and proprietor of the Bay Tree Hotel, was stabbed in the right arm last night while ejecting an intoxicated man from his hotel. A doctor was promptly summoned and the wound dressed. While the injury was not considered serious it is of a painful nature.

A man who gives his name as William Delaney, and who claims that he has no permanent place of abode in the city, was arrested at short time at the stabling by Policeman Smith and is now held in Court St. station charged with wounding Mr. McCaffery. The prisoner was under the influence of liquor when taken into custody, but strenuously maintains his innocence. He says he was born in England and is about 45 years of age. About 9:45 o'clock last night Mr. McCaffery says Delaney entered his hotel noticeably under the influence of liquor, and declared that he intended to make a tour of inspection of the rooms. Mr. McCaffery attempted to dissuade him, but Delaney became disorderly, and then Mr. McCaffery found it necessary to put him out. As he was forcing Delaney through the revolving doors, it is alleged Delaney drew a jack-knife from his pocket and inflicted a deep wound in Mr. McCaffery's right arm. Once out of the hotel, Delaney made his way north on Bay street. Mr. M. King, of 32 Church street, who witnessed the stabbing, followed Delaney, and at the corner of Temperance street saw Constable Smith. He at once called the officer, and Delaney was placed under arrest. The hotel, where Mr. McCaffery and Mr. King identified him. He will appear in the police court this morning.

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GENOSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 16 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of the Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not for the District). Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not for the District), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years after earning homesteaded price. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where the land is in certain districts. A homesteader in certain districts may pre-empt a quarter-section standing, may pre-empt a quarter-section standing his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homesteaded price. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where the land is in certain districts. A homesteader in certain districts may pre-empt a quarter-section standing, may pre-empt a quarter-section standing his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or rocky land. Live stock may be kept on the cultivation under certain conditions.
