Under the new act you will have local government to a certain extent, as soon as it can be organized."

"He should arrive here by August 1, as that days is the commencement of his term. He will have six counselfors, and the seven will make the laws for the district. The city itself should incorporate as a municipality and then it every could regulate its streets, lights, fire protection; himse
