CLOSING OF EXHIBITION

The closing exercises of the exhibition at Kentville took place at 9 o'clock last Thursday evening, and a large number were present. President H. H. Wickwire was in the chair and made several happy and encouraging remarks in reference to the exhibition. Sir Frederick Borden was to speak, but owing to much expectancy and his speech was just what the people were anxious to hear about and he spoke with an uncertain sound. The exhibition through our Boards of Trade and in our columns for an Agricultural College in this valley and for better facilities in the transshipment of fruit to Great Britain were dealt with by him in a way which delighted the audience—for even the ladies were interested in these questions which our fruit growers have been working out.

Mr. Wickwire suggested that the magnificent display of fruit be placed in the hands of the Canadian High Commissioner to be placed on exhibition in London. This was moved by Councillor J. W. Kinsman and carried.

The chairman hoped that we would have an exhibition like this, if not every year, at least very often. He spoke of the great services rendered by Secretary Rockwell and Treasurer Chas. Smith. He considered the burning question was to have an agricultural college established in our midst.

Mr. P. Innes said he had always contended for district exhibitions and believed it would help the Provincial one. He congratulated the promoters on the great exhibit, and also referred to the many disadvantages suffered by inadequate and proper shipment of the fruit across the Atlantic.

M. G. deWolfe referred to the outcome of the exhibition 9 years ago. The N. S. F. G. A. have now a medal for that fruit which was afterwards exhibited in the old country.

Mayor Yould stated how pleased the town had been to entertain all the exhibitors and friends.

Sir Frederick Borden said he had consolation in two facts that this fair had been a great success and that it was likely to be repeated annually. He considered it a great idea to have our fruit re-exhibited in the great metropolis of the world and be viewed there with wonder by millions. The Canadian arch had been a great advertisement to Canada and this would be another for this valley. There were two considerations of prime importance to us—education and transportation. We should have in the centre of the valley, a college similar to the one at Guelph, an institution that would command the respect of the country so that our young men may have the best possible training. This country has lost thousands of young men because of this lack of training. We had places where men were qualified for preachers who were of course necessary; for doctors who were more necessary and for lawyers who were not necessary, (applause) but we had no education for the agriculturist. There was no nobler profession for one who understands it and it should be more honored than ever it was. In it there was greater chance for advancement and development than in any other profession, for agriculture was a profession.

In reference to transportation Mr. Innes had said there were more barrels of apples shipped from Halifax than any other port. That should help solve the question. He (Sir Frederick) was prepared to consider the matter of subsidies and if it would help the matter of export, he would impress upon his colleagues for an increase. He believed we would have a fast service soon, one that would carry our fruit in 5 to 6 days to London. He understood that the boats at present were only 8 days. The solution is coming when in the near future we will export 800,000 barrels. He would do anything in his power according to his light to solve this problem of the fruit growers. He advised the young men to stay at home and build up the country. If the West was great, Nova Scotia with its fruits he now beheld and other industries was greater.
