THEY'RE KAFFIRGRAMS

Stories of Glorious British Victories Turn Out Only Native Yarns.

London, Nov. 21.—The latest direct news from Ladysmith, dated Thursday, Nov. 16, and Friday, Nov. 17, strangely conflicts with the reiterated reports of "tremendous battles and great British victories." Wednesday and Thursday. Neither of the messages above referred to, though dispatched on the days following the date of the alleged fights, mention any great engagements or Boer defeats. On the contrary, both distinctly state that beyond a false alarm on Tuesday evening, and a little increased shell-fire on Thursday and Friday, causing little damage, everything was perfectly quiet, and the garrison was chafing under its enforced inactivity. Nevertheless, special despatches from Estcourt to-day enlarge on the reported battles, and insist that the Boers received a more terrible lesson Wednesday than in any previous fight. According to these circumstantial accounts, the Boers determined to attempt to reach the north end of Ladysmith with a large force, but they were unable to make headway against the well sustained fire of the British riflemen and Maxim's. There, it is added, a British force worked round the Boer flank, causing the latter to withdraw under a deadly fusillade, with exceedingly heavy losses. Large numbers of dead and wounded are said to have been left on the field, and a number of prisoners were captured. The British losses are reported trivial.

Of course, reliable despatches corroborative of the above may have been censured or captured with the native runners. But these things they have a distinct flavor of being belated accounts from Kaffir source of affairs previously reported.

WILL SOON BE ON IN EARNEST.
In some quarters to think Gen. Joubert possibly initiated the story with the object of inducing Gen. White to make a serious attack or relax his precautions, so as to permit the Boers to seize ground vital to the defense of the town.

LATE NOTES OF THE CAMPAIGN.
A report from Durban, however, says there are rumors there that the Boers are preparing to break camp and withdraw from the investment of Ladysmith.

The transport City of Cambridge, with the second battalion of the Scottish Rifles, arrived at Durban this morning.

NO ELECTION TILL JUNE.
Toronto Star: "There will be no general election until after another session," said a prominent Liberal this morning. "An election was decided on some time ago, but plans have changed, and an appeal will not be made to the people until next June at least."

THE U. S. NOW HAS NO VICE-PRESIDENT.
Paterson, N. J., Nov. 21.—Vice-President Garret A. Hobart died at 8:30 this morning. He had been failing for some time.

A despatch from Ladysmith tells of brilliant British victories with comparatively slight loss on our side and heavy slaughter of the enemy. Ladysmith is full of wounded and captured Boers. It is reported that in the fighting on Nov. 9 the enemy lost 300 killed and 500 in captured.

The trial of William Weir, charged with furnishing the Government with a false statement of the affairs of La Banque d'Ville Marie, has commenced in the court of queen's bench at Montreal.

Deputy game wardens and hunters from Muskoka and Parry Sound district, report that most of the deer set this year were shot in the water. They also report open violation of the close season fishing laws on Moon River.

Francois Bock, of Providence, R. I., a jeweler; John Trehan, and Steward George Taylor, of the Canardier Eturia, have been arrested by New York officials, on a charge of smuggling pearls. Fifty boxes of pearls were taken from the baggage of Bock, who came over on the steamship. The seizure is valued at \$50,000.

JOHN SYMES PASSES AWAY.
John Symes, Centre street, passed away early this morning after an illness of some five weeks from paralysis. Mr. Symes was born in Jersey, Channel Islands, forty-nine years since and came to this country some 20 years ago. Deceased had been an employee of A. Heyward and then of Geo. Heyward, grocer, for fifteen years as driver. He was a consistent member of Christ church, sang in the choir and was a hard Sunday school worker. He will be much missed. Mr. Symes was a member of Court Unity, No. 6800, A. O. F., and has held all the important offices in the gift of that court. He was also a member Court Chatham of the Independent Order of Foresters. He was treasurer for many years of the Juvenile Foresters, in fact, from their inception. He was connected with the members of the A. O. F. for \$1,000, also in the I. O. F. for \$1,000. He leaves to mourn his loss a wife, two daughters, Minnie and Dora, and one son, Bruce, and his aged mother, all of whom resided with him. He has two brothers in Detroit, Edward and George, former Chathamites. The funeral will take place to-morrow at 2 o'clock from his late residence, Centre street, to Christ Church, at which the A. O. F. and I. O. F. will attend. Deceased was a staunch Liberal Conservative in politics.
