### THE HINDOO'S GRIEF

TOLD WITH RICH IMAGERY AND IM-PASSIONED EASTERN LANGUAGE.

Sketch From the Pen of a Sarath Kumar Ghosh, Which Was Addressed to All His Countrymen When the King Was Stricken Down Before the Coronation Day Appointed in June-It Breathes Loyal Spirit.

The London Daily Express, usually distinguished among its London contemporaries by some unique journalistic feature on great occasions, and its departure from the beaten track the day after the announcement of the King's illness and the collapse of the coronation pageant was to print a sketch from the pen of a cultivated Hindoo expressing the grief felt by his countrymen at the blow that had fallen upon the King of England and the Emperor of his own ancient land. The sketch is from the pen of A. Sarath Kumar Ghosh, and is addressed to all his countrymen. It is full of the rich imagery and impassioned language of the east, and breathes a spirit of loyalty which could not be surpassed in any English-speaking section of the Empire. The writer says:

O best beloved that dwell on the langes and the Jumna and the Godevery and the Krishna, from the snows of Gaurisanker to the coral shores of Comorin, what shadow is this that has fallen upon ye all? Bearded warriors, scarred with the wounds of a hundred battles, bow their heads and walk with tottering feet; youthful maidens at the village wells turn from their empty pitchers and gaze vacantly upon the face of the waters; white-haired pundits read to the village folks the omens of dimmed stars and lowering clouds; sweet-voiced women behind pinjra lattice hush the esthraj's dulcet harmony and sing no more. Whence is this, oh ye people?

In plague and pestilence and famine we have not wept, for they were in our accustomed lot, but this changing of a diadem to a wreath of tears s a grievous thing. O my brothers! What sin have we committed that this should happen to us-we and our fourteen incarnations before us?

But yesterday our Princes and our chosen people had crossed seven oceans to escort our Emperor to his crown with pride and joy and exultation. And now their hearts weep around his stricken bed in silen tears. Gone is their joy ... Their eyes are dimmed, their manes uncombed. their hoofs unshod; their nostrils breathe no more the fire of victory For the Star of India shines not to day; the Mount of Light has lost its istre, and the Splendor of India its

In the hour of majesty has come to him the frailty of man. But yesterday the sacred oils upon his brow and bosom would have anointed him the twice-born of heaven. And now the hand of fate gives him healing

herbs instead. But yesterday all Ind had turned her gaze westward beyond the ocean waves and in her heart had witness ed the setting of the crown upon his brow, yearning to witness the yet greater scene in her own Imperial city, when he would be enthroned as her Supreme King. And now, strew-ing ashes upon her head and donning the saffron robe, she stands upon her western shore and mingles her bitter tears with the tears of the sea. For to-day the hand of late has turned the splendor of her King to the

frailty of man. But, O best beloved, because o that very frailty our hearts are at his feet. We would have honored him as our crowned Emperor and done him homage upon our knees Now we hold him as our father, and

weep upon his hands and feet in loving tears. For the seeming shadow that has come upon him is but the brightness of a jewel upon his crown-the tears of the parting bride that is but the forty-rayed star of diamonds, rubies and pearls upon her brow. Now we know him to be our chosen one. This sorrow is to him but as the lily of Cashmere to the maiden's cheek and the lotus of the Jumna to her lips-

Have we not prayed daily that in the fulness of time he would yet deign to visit his peorle, and enthroned upon the throne of Delhi, of the selfsame Ak-bar, Prithiraj, and Vikrama, be also enthroned in the hearts of his people and reign therein for every

PROFIT-SHARING.

An Interesting Experiment by the Street Bailway Company of Vancourer-

Stannard Wages, Jon. The adoption of a practical system of profit-sharing by the Street Railway Company of Vancouver is an experiment that will be of interest to all who watch the development of our industrial system. The Indepen-dent, a weekly, published in the interests of organized labor in Vancouver. B.C., gives a report of an address by Manager Buntzen of the Street Railway Company, to a mass meeting of workmen, which was also addressed by Fres dant Mahon of the Street Railway Men's Union of Amverica. The meeting shows the haronious relation hip existing between the Street Railway Company and its imployes. The company was voluntarily decided that the regular employes shall receive as their share of its profits, ene-third of the amount available for dividends after the ordnary shareholders have received 4 per cent. This means, as estimated, that at the end of the first year each employe will receive about \$30, at the end of the second year the share will be about \$50, and in five years it will be \$100. The men will eceive the standard union wages Manager Buntzen says that in his opinion the increased interest in the ompany's welfare on the part of the employes created by the new system will add so much to the company's success that the shareholders, as well as the men, will gain by the innovation. The employes' proportion of the

profits will be divided equally among them, all being considered as units in making the Company's business a success. In addition to this voluntary concession, the company pays as high wages for every class of work as are paid by other local employers, and, generally speaking, higher wages. The company also higher wages. makes certain concessions in the way of uniforms, light and transportation, that employers in other lines of business are not in a position to grant. It is customary to look for focks in the way of all such indus-trial experiments. Men do not work for low wages, nor under unfavorable onditions, voluntarily, but because they are forced to do so by the conditions of the labor market. nodel employer, the man who voluntarily does more than he is forced to do, because he sees that there is something wrong and the men are entitled to more, is worthy of all honor. One of the difficulties of a scheme is that employment with him acquires an economic value which the workman may be forced to pay to middle men or intermediaries. But it is time enough to look for washing paint. It takes off the stains such trouble when it begins to develop. A good relationship and a feeling of mutual interest have a value that cannot be accurately estimated in dollars, and these have been secured already by the Vancouver Street Railway Company. may learn some day that an honest desire to do right can cure most of the industrial evils of modern socie-

TORONTO STOCK EXCHANGE.

Formal Resolutions Which Called It Into

Being July 26, 1852. It has, for some time past, been in contemplation to establish a : o k Exchange in Toronto, for the purpose of affording to all parties interested in the transfer of stocks, and other public securities, greater facilities in effecting their respective operations, than are at present possessed, and also to extend the circulation of Canadian credit and establish uniform charge for the transaction of all business coming within the range of Stock or Share Broker. With this object in view a meeting of gentlemen engaged in this business was held on Monday, the 26th July, for the purpose of taking the subject

into consideration. Mr. Barrow was called to the chair, and Mr. James Fraser requested to act as secretary. After the subject had been thoroughly discussed, and the advantages of such an institution in Canada had been clearly set forth, the following resolutions were unanimously adopt-

1. Resolved-That the great in crease of business in stocks and the importance now attaching to Canadian securities generally render it expedient to form a Stock Exchange in

Resolved-That in consequence the very low rate of interest obtained in the London market, capitalists have been induced to turn their attention to Canada, offering as it does, good security and better rate of interest on investments, and it is therefore desirable to fix that attention more firmly upon the adantages of Canadian securities gen-

Resolved-That Toronto being. the most central point of attraction to capitalists neeking investments in Canada, this city is deemed and considered to be in every respect the most convenient locality in which to establish an Association of Brokers.


5. Resolved—That as citizens of Toronto we consider we are dicharging an important duty in taking the lead in Canada by the establishment of an Association, as well adapted to

promote and extend the general interests of this Province. 6. Resolved, therefore, that the gentlemen now present do constitute themselves an association to be decominated the Toronto Stock Exchange."-From the Toronto Globe
