'Dusty Dan" k ce's Romantic Career Ended.

Famous, Generous Showman Died Peor Man Drink and Demestic Trouble Proved His Ruin.

New York, Feb 24 .- Dan Rice, the New York, Feb 24.—Dan Rice, the veteran circus clown, diedrate Long Branch, N. J., last night after a lingering illness, aged 77. Mr. Rice had been in ill health for several months from Bright's disease.

His real name was Daniel McLaren. He was born in New York? His father nicknamed the boy Dan Rice, after a famous clown in Ireland. Dan Rice

famous clown in Ireland. Dan. Rice made three independent fortunes. He died, however, a comparatively poor man. He leaves a widow in Texas. Rice was probably the greatest all-

round showman this country has ever seen. Few men have possessed more of those qualities which go to make up a popular idol. In the days of our professional acrobat. His first public appearance is said to have been at a prize fight, in which he met a noted pugilist named George Kensett. This contest took place in 1828 and the leg-islature of Pennsylvania adjourned to

witness the battle. Besides being an athlete and acrobat Dan had a natural "gift of gab." Although uneducated, he could tell a story, sing a song or deliver a stump speech in such a manner as to draw and hold crowds of people, and these gifts led him into the circus ring. At this time he assumed the name "Dan this time he assumed the name "Dan Rice," which he retained. As Dan was the whole show wherever the circus went, he soon became a proprietor and for years travelled the country with a show in which he and a snow-white horse named "Excelsior" were the partienlar stars

entertainment, although he was a bad financier, and his ready wit enabled financier, and his ready wit enabled him to keep on the top wave of popu-larity in spite of the efforts of better managers. His outfit was styled "Dan Rice's Great and Only Show," but his rivals called it "Rice's One Horse Show," although there was no lack of other attractions in his circus.

GENEROUS TO CHARITY. When his rivals billed ahead of him

when his rivals billed ahead of him and jumped his route, Dan would make for the town in which a rival show was being presented. Without previous billing he would plant his tents and, mounting the balcony of the leading hotel, deliver a speech which would catch the crowd. Then he would lead the way to his show grounds, followed by a mob of enthusiasts, and the other showmen would play to empty

benches.

Inside the confederate lines he hoist ed the rebel flag during the days of the war, and in northern territory he showed the stars and stripes. His progress was accompanied by many charities, and he left not a few monuments to his generosity in vari-

ous parts of the country. He erected a handsome iron fence about one of the public parks in New Orleans. He made liberal donations to churches, orphan asylums and other charities. The soldiers' monument at Erie, Pa., was erected at his expense. As he rode through the streets he often scattered a hatful of coins among his fol-

lowers. Unbusinesslike management caused him much financial trouble, and finally he associated himself with Fore-paugh and became the chief attrac-tion of that show. His salary ranged from \$25,000 to \$27,000 a year, and this was the highest pay ever earned in the profession. It was not at all strange that so much popularity should turn the head of an almost ilshould turn the head of an almost illiterate showman, and so when his agents billed Broadway, New York, with posters bearing the legend, "For President, Col. Dan Rice, of Pennsylvania," he took the matter seriously. Later he insisted on being sent to congress, with perfect seriousness.

Even in his dark days he did not lack for friends who supplied him with the necessities of life.
