Fleeing for his life before the enraged crowd, the pedler escaped by jumping on a passing car. When the police reached the scene the wagon was found stripped. Even the seat and movable boards had been carried away for fire wood.

DEAD BESIDE MOTHER

POPULAR PASTOR

Rev. J. H. Osterhout Takes Charge of His New Duties at Wrocteter.

The many Maple City friends of Rev. John H. Osterhout will be pleased to learn that he is meeting with success in his new charge at Wrocteter. The Wrocteter Star publishes an excellent likeness of Mr. Osterhout, accompanied by the following complimentary note:

"The above is a photograph of the new pastor of the Methodist church here, who commenced his duties on this circuit early in July, and who is rapidly becoming popular as a preacher and church worker. In other ways, Rev. Mr. Osterhout was born in the County of Kent, Ont., where he received his early education. He attended the Bridgetown High school for a time and then went to the Chatham Collegiate Institute from which he matriculated into the University of Toronto. He was graduated with honors in Philosophy from Toronto in 1900, and received the degree of B. A. in 1903 from Victoria University. As a probationer he travelled for two years on the Jesuette's Great Circuit and one year at Northwood. He was ordained in Winnipeg in June, 1903, and spent last year at Rutherford. Successful revival services have attended his work on all his circuits and we predict for him a successful term at Wrocteter."

A GOOD SIGN

The fact that these young men are not only splendid students, but also leaders in the different college societies, testifies to their popularity and their engaging in this strenuous work through their whole vacation is evidence of intense zeal. Reports from Toronto, London, Woodstock and St. Thomas all agree that this student band is the most remarkable phase of Christian life in this generation. The services of the McMaster Band in the William St. Baptist Church were attended by large congregations and no doubt the large airy Park Street Church will also be well filled even though the season is unfavorable. It was the only week that the Maple City could secure them.

Miss A. Seer, of Winnipeg, is visiting her many friends here.

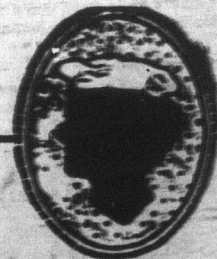
