

By the aid of a clever architect and his own staff of men, the speculator at once transforms the speculator at once transforms the house or shop so completely that it virtually becomes a new property, and local authorities are for the most part thoroughly complaisant in aiding even the renumbering of such a house, where the thing is at all feasible. In particular, the identical room in which the awful crime has been perpetrated is always altered so absolutely as to become unrecognisable to those previously familiar with
