FORESTERS AT THE CHURCH

Rev. Mr. Cobblecluck Delivers Earnest Address to Fraternal Organizations

Were Led by Regimental Band and Marshallled by Officer Dezellia—Votes of Thanks

The annual sermon of the Independent Order of Foresters was preached in Park street Methodist church last evening by the Rev. G. H. Cobblecluck, B. A. The number of Foresters in attendance was very large, including a number of the companion lodge, who occupied the front seats, more than filling the entire centre of the church. The procession was headed by the 24th Kent Regimental Band and Marshallled by P. C. Peter Dezellia.

The Rev. Mr. Cobblecluck welcomed the Order both as individuals and as a lodge, and also welcomed the band.

Mr. Cobblecluck chose as his text Galatians the sixth chapter, the first, second and fifth verses:

"If any man be overtaken in fault, ye who are spiritual restore such a one in the spirit of meekness, considering your own selves lest ye also be tempted."

"Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ."

"For every man shall bear his own burden."

In opening Mr. Cobblecluck stated that a new feeling for Christ was said by an eminent authority to be the dominant element in modern theology, while "back to Christ" is the watchword of a large school of present day interpreters of the word of God. Christ is being increasingly recognized as both the originating and regulative mind—the eternal form or rule of life and conduct and the dignity is for Christ's religion.

His words "our Father" are the great leveler of ranks and the charter of fraternity. He showed that Christ's religion was an advance on that which succeeded him being positive instead of negative. The text gives us a special illustration of the great law of all organized life that the strong should help the weak. Those overtaken in a fault were to be restored. Instead of striking at the bruise it was to be bandaged and healed. The power of the keys is given to us, and by our coldness to one who has erred we bind his sin upon him, while by our sympathy we loose it. This general law of the strong helping the weak is here applied specially to burden bearing. There is really no contradiction in the text. The word for burden in verse two means everything that one may bear for another, while the word in verse five means his own load. In burden bearing contact is necessary, and to make it effective it must be both personal and mutual. The need is that burdens be equalized. A suspension bridge is so constructed with both ends firmly fastened in strong foundations that when the load comes upon any one part the strain is divided over the entire bridge. This is the benefit derived from the law of burden bearing.

The old charity of alms giving, which assumed the superiority of the giver over the receiver and degraded the masses, is replaced by the newer and better charity of mutual helpfulness. As Emerson has said, "He is my best friend who can make me do my best," and the best help is to enable others to help themselves. There is more kindness in getting a man to join the I. O. F. than in taking up a subscription for his widow and orphans after he is dead.

The I. O. F. is on the true plan of charity. Its character is indicated by its motto, "Love, Benevolence and Concord."

Mr. Cobblecluck said he was glad to see many church members among the Foresters present; as a tree's fruit contains the seed of the future tree; so the reflex influence of fraternal societies should be helpful to the church and the Kingdom of Christ. Such societies grew only in a Christian soil and their rapid growth has been rendered possible only by the Christian atmosphere that the churches have through the ages produced. The church welcomes the order. Let the order assist and appreciate the church. Your order has 222,000 members, and is celebrating its 32nd anniversary. Its purpose is to enable the widow to keep her family by her and rear and train them when the husband and father is gone. To such bereaved ones the order has paid \$16,000,000, and now paying every day of the year \$6,500 besides carrying \$4,000 daily to the emergency fund. Besides all this are the sick and funeral benefits. The help rendered is privately given and accompanied by sympathy. All this is certainly Christian, but in addition to it the privilege is yours, by personal influence, to restore the brother overtaken in fault. Learn the true spirit of your order from the Great Teacher himself and the secret of burden bearing.

The church was filled and the discourse was listened to with the keenest interest. The choir rendered two excellent anthems, under the able leadership of H. Edythe Hill.

Returning to the lodge room, votes of thanks were passed to the Rev. G. H. Cobblecluck, the choir and the managers of the church.

The turnout of the I. O. F. was one of the largest seen in Chatham in some time. There were about 300 in the parade.
