WOMAN IN AN ELECTION

Figures as an Agent in the Kingston Cross-Petition.

is Alleged by Mr. Pence, M. P. P., to Have Distributed Money for Corrupt Purposes in Mr. McIntyre's Behalf—Forty-Six Main Charges Are Made by the Liberal Against the Conservatives—A Central Fund.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—Woman is said to be at the bottom of most of the mischievous deeds of this wicked world. In her latest role she appears as agent in the election at Kingston, and, according to particulars filed by E. J. B. Pence, M. P. P., in his cross-petition against Donald M. McIntyre, the Conservative candidate, she has shown much tactical skill. The trial takes place Oct. 30. Pence alleges that Kathleen Somerville officiated as agent for his opponent, McIntyre, and gave Charles Brant cash for his vote. She is also alleged to have received \$10 from McIntyre to wage an election for to the probable results of the election, it being suggested that this was a subtle attempt on her part to influence his vote.

A Central Fund.

Further sums, it is alleged, were received from a central fund raised by the Conservative party for use in the hiring of rigs and other corrupt purposes.

A personal charge is that the respondent gave Charles Bryant money on other consideration for his vote.

Bribery, or the promise of money, is charged against Edward Ryan, J. F. Searns, R. N. McFarlane, Henry Angrove, Michael Dolan, A. E. Ross, John Gaskin and others.

Money For Ward Workers.

That money was distributed or that they assisted in the distribution of money to ward workers to be used in bribery is charged against George A. McGowan, A. E. Ross, Kathleen Somerville, Roger Dewey, J. P. Gratton, H. W. Richardson, F. J. Hoag, John Morgan Shaw, Henry Angrove, Wm. G. Simons, John Hewton and Alex. C. Vaggoner.

George A. Payne is said to have given money to ward workers for the purpose of securing the election of Thomas Brightman, Benjamin Curzon, George Cornelius, Sr., Robert Downey, Thos. E. Moncrieff, Thos. and Earl Robinson, W. A. Vaele, Ernest A. Waltham, James Hurst and one Holland.
