## SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held on Monday evening, all the members being present except Mayor Sutherland.

Chairman Eaton reported the engagement of Miss Isabel Hawley as assistant teacher of the Kindergarten department for the remainder of the present term at a salary of \$100.

It was reported to the Board that the screens for the windows of the new building had been secured and it was ordered that these be placed in position on Saturday so as not to interfere with the school work.

## MEMORIAL BUILDING AT GRAND PRE

The first car-load of stone from the golf grounds has reached Grand Pre to be used in the construction of the Memorial building. The foundation is completed and grading of excavated material will make ready the ground for the erection of the building. It will face the old Acadian road fronting south with a steeple nearly 100 feet from the ground. The front will have three large doors the full width of the building. Five stone steps with a broad upper space will occupy the whole front with the floor of the building at the same height. As designed by the architects for the general plan of the building and grounds and the other monuments to be placed in the Grand Pre Park, the building will face south, where logically the main approach should be, and we presume will be in time. This will make the historic road still existing the principal entrance to the Park which is all developing with this desirable end in view. The Park has received other trees this year in addition to those already set out. An artisan well has been sunk west of the station with success, as water is running from the top of the pipe already set. The work of building a tank will be started at once on the foundation posts now ready. The tank will supply the engines of the road instead of the old one in use so many years nearer Wolfville. This new tank will make available water for the ponds and gardens of the Park and when in full operation will add greatly to the beauty of the Park. Many beds are now in blossom, and the place is receiving visitors in increasing numbers.

Mr. J. D. Chambers has begun the erection of a residence on his property on the lot east of his own dwelling which we understand will be occupied when completed by Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Blakeney.

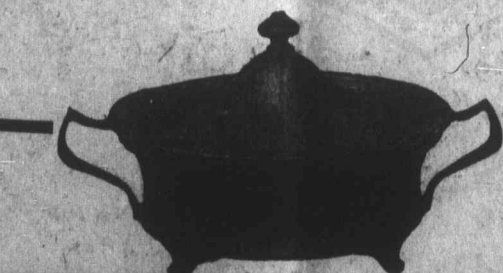
